He is old, and his strength is diminished. He brings eleven warriors, but ten of them flee. Only Wiglaf stays to help. Beowulf is fatally wounded, but with Wiglaf's help, he kills the dragon. The Heroic Code

We see this in the story of Sigemund (told inside the poem as a digression) and the story of Heremod, a bad king who was cruel to his people. Wiglaf embodies the ideal of loyalty when he refuses to flee from the dragon. He stands by his king, proving that even in a

preservation is strong, loyalty is the highest virtue. This is a classic topic for **Beowulf test questions and answers** regarding moral values.
