Answer: A) Expressionism. Munch's *The Scream* (1893) is a seminal work of Expressionism, emphasizing subjective emotion over naturalistic representation. Impressionism (B)

focuses on light and everyday scenes, Fauvism (C) on bold color but with less psychological angst, and Post-Impressionism (D) includes varied styles like Cézanne's structural approach.

Question 3 (No image, contextual)

The use of gold leaf, stylized figures, and symbolic colors in Byzantine icons primarily served to:

- A) Showcase the artist's technical skill
- B) Convey the divine and otherworldly nature of spiritual figures
