- Move slowly with your breath for 6–8 rounds.

These simple movements awaken the spine and release tension in the upper body.

Step-by-Step Beginner Yoga Poses

1. Mountain Pose (Tadasana)

2. Downward-Facing Dog (Adho Mukha Svanasana)

Benefits: Stretches hamstrings, calves, spine, and shoulders; builds arm strength.

1. From all fours, tuck your toes under and lift your hips up and back, straightening your legs as much as is comfortable.
2. Press your hands firmly into the mat, spread your fingers, and relax your head between your arms.
3. Keep a slight bend in your knees if your hamstrings are tight. Aim for a straight line from hands to hips, not necessarily straight legs.
4. Pedal your heels gently by bending one knee and then the other to warm the legs.
5. Stay for 5 breaths. To release, lower your knees to the floor.

3. Warrior I (Virabhadrasana I)

Benefits: Strengthens legs, hips, and core; opens chest and shoulders.

1. From Downward Dog, step your right foot forward between your hands. Turn your left foot out about 45 degrees.
2. Lift your torso upright, bringing your arms overhead with palms facing each other (or hands together). Keep hips squared forward.
3. Bend your front knee to a 90-degree angle (knee over ankle, not beyond). Keep back leg straight and strong.
4. Lengthen your tailbone down. Hold for 3–5 breaths. Step back to Downward Dog and repeat on the left side.

4. Tree Pose (Vrikshasana)

Benefits: Improves balance, strengthens ankles and core.

1. Stand in Mountain Pose. Shift weight onto your left foot.
2. Place the sole of your right foot on your left inner thigh, calf, or ankle—avoid the knee joint.
3. Bring your hands to your heart center or raise them overhead.
4. Find a steady gaze point (drishti) about 4–5 feet ahead on the floor.
5. Hold for 3–5 breaths, then switch sides. If you wobble, that is okay—balance improves with practice.

5. Child’s Pose (Balasana)

Benefits: Restorative stretch for back, hips, and mind.

1. From all fours, bring your big toes together and sit back onto your heels. Separate your knees wide apart (or keep them together for a milder stretch).
2. Lengthen your spine and slowly fold forward, draping your torso between your thighs.
3. Rest your forehead on the mat or on a block. Arms can rest alongside your body or extend forward.
4. Breathe deeply and hold for at least 5 breaths, or as long as comfortable. This is a resting pose you can return to anytime.

Creating a Simple 15-Minute Routine

A consistent short practice is far more valuable than a long irregular one. Combine the warm-up, poses above, and a cool-down below into a **step by step yoga for beginners** sequence. Here is a suggested flow:
