The Rider-Waite-Smith

The RWS system is rich in Christian, Hermetic, and Kabbalistic symbolism. the RWS tradition is an excellent place to start, as the majority of learning resources and guidebooks are written with this system in mind.

The Thoth Tradition (Aleister Crowley)

Created by the controversial occultist Aleister Crowley and painted by Lady Frieda Harris, the Thoth tarot deck is a masterpiece of esoteric complexity. Completed in 1944, its artwork is a stunning blend of Art Deco, Cubist, and Egyptian influences. The Thoth system is deeply rooted in Crowley's philosophy of Thelema and integrates elements from astrology, alchemy, and the Qabalah.

Where the RWS deck often uses soft, pastoral scenes, the Thoth deck uses bold, vibrant colors and abstract, dynamic forms. Its Minor Arcana are also fully illustrated but are far more symbolic and less literal than the RWS scenes. Card names are sometimes different (e.g., Strength becomes Lust, Justice is numbered 11 instead of 8). This is

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not as beginner-friendly as most, but for those drawn to deep, multi-layered symbolism and a more philosophical approach to tarot, the Thoth tradition offers an incredibly rich and rewarding system. It represents a highly distinct and powerful category among the types of tarot card decks.

The Marseille Tradition (TdM)

The Tarot de Marseille (TdM) is the oldest of the three major traditions, with its distinctive style emerging in the 17th century. Unlike the RWS and Thoth systems, the Marseille deck does not have fully illustrated Minor Arcana. Instead, the numbered cards (Ace through Ten) display only the suit symbols arranged in a specific pattern—for example, ten cups arranged to show the "Tree of Life" pattern, or seven swords crossed in a specific way.

Reading with a Marseille deck requires a different skill set. It relies less on pictorial narrative for the Minor Arcana and more on

numerology, the symbolism of the suit itself, and the card's position in the spread. The Major Arcana in a Marseille deck features bold, medieval-style illustrations with simple, powerful figures. This tradition is highly respected for its historical purity and its focus on the core arithmetic and structural meanings of the cards. For those interested in a more traditional, less narrative-driven style of reading, exploring Marseille-style decks is a fascinating path that offers a purer look at how tarot was originally practiced.

2. Modern and Thematic Decks: A World of Artistic Expression

The overwhelming majority of new tarot decks created today fall into this category. They use the structure of a traditional system (usually RWS) but wrap it in a unique artistic or thematic package. This has made exploring the **types of tarot card**

These decks often use simple shapes, bold colors, and geometric patterns to convey the essence of a card's meaning. They strip away complex imagery, forcing the reader to rely more on intuition and the core symbolism of color and shape. These are often chosen by experienced readers who find the detailed imagery of traditional decks distracting, or by art lovers who appreciate a sleek, modern aesthetic.

3. Specialty and Divinatory Systems

It is also important to understand the distinction between a tarot deck and other forms of cartomancy. Several closely related types of card sets are often confused with tarot, but they function differently.

The Lenormand Deck

Developed in the early 19th century, the Lenormand deck is a completely separate system from tarot. It typically consists of 36 cards, each with a simple, symbolic illustration (like a fox, a ring, or a ship). The meaning of a Lenormand card is more fixed and literal than a tarot card. For instance, "The Ring" in Lenormand generally signifies a contract, commitment, or marriage, with far less nuance than "The Lovers" card in tarot. Lenormand readings are often done using a "square" layout (like a 3x3 or 4x4 grid) where the meaning is derived from how cards combine with their neighbors. It is a fantastic system for answering specific, practical questions.

Oracle Decks

Oracle decks are the most free-form category of divinatory cards. They have no standard structure—a deck might have any number of cards (typically 40 to 60), and they are not divided into Major and Minor

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Arda is 6 independent entity with its own message, often a single word or phrase (like "Trust," "Abundance," or "New Beginnings") accompanied by a beautiful illustration. Oracle decks are often used for daily inspiration, meditation, or as a supplement to tarot readings to provide additional clarity and a different energetic focus. They are extremely accessible and intuitive, making them popular for both beginners and experienced spiritual practitioners.

Miniature and Pocket Decks
