Let's be clear from the start: there are no ferries, cargo ships offering passenger berths, or cruise lines that regularly call here as a simple port of call. For the vast majority of independent travelers, there is only one viable answer to the question of **how to get to Easter Island**: by air. The airport, Mataverí International Airport (IPC), is a former NASA emergency landing strip for the Space Shuttle. It is long enough to handle wide-body aircraft, but it serves a very limited number of destinations.

The Primary Gateway: Santiago, Chile (SCL)

The undisputed capital of access to Easter Island is Santiago, Chile. Currently, the only airline operating regular commercial flights to Mataverí Airport is **LATAM Airlines**. They operate a near-daily service (with frequency varying by season) connecting Arturo Merino Benítez International Airport (SCL) in Santiago to IPC. This is the standard route for the vast majority

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of visitors.

- **Flight Duration:** Approximately 5 to 6 hours non-stop.
- **Aircraft:** Typically a Boeing 787 Dreamliner or an Airbus A350, which are large, modern, and comfortable for the long over-water hop.
- **Frequency:** Usually one flight per day, sometimes more during peak season (December to March).

Booking this flight is the most crucial part of planning. Prices are notoriously high and demand is intense. It is not uncommon for seats to sell out months in advance, especially during the summer months and for the island's major cultural festival, Tapati Rapa Nui, held in February.

The Secondary Gateway: Tahiti (PPT)

For those looking for a more adventurous or multi-destination itinerary, there is a tantalizing alternative. For a brief period each year, LATAM also operates a once-weekly flight connecting **Faa'a International Airport (PPT) in Tahiti, French**

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Polynesia, to Easter Island. This flight is a continuation of the Santiago route. It flies from Santiago to Easter Island, then continues to Tahiti, and returns the same way.

This route is a game-changer for travelers who want to combine a trip to the moai with the stunning islands of French Polynesia without backtracking through Chile. However, it is seasonal and the seats are extremely limited. If you are planning a South Pacific journey that includes both destinations, this is a spectacular way to do it.

Step-by-Step Planning: Booking Your Tickets to Rapa Nui

Knowing **how to get to Easter Island** is more than just knowing the airport codes. The booking strategy is where most people get tripped up. Here is a practical, step-by-step approach to securing your seat on that coveted flight.

1. Book as Far in Advance as

Possible

This cannot be overstated. Many travelers plan their trip to Easter Island a year in advance. LATAM typically releases its flight schedules about 11 months ahead of time. If you have fixed travel dates, book the moment the seats become available. Last-minute bookings are possible but extremely expensive and risky.

2. Choose Your Travel Dates Wisely

The high season (December through March) sees the highest prices and the most competition for seats. The shoulder seasons (April-May and October-November) offer a much better balance of good weather and lower demand. The absolute lowest prices are usually found during the Chilean winter (June-August), but the weather on the island is cooler, windier, and rainier.

3. Consider a Package or Multi-City Booking

LATAM often offers packages that include flights and accommodation through their "LATAM Pass" or "LATAM

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Holidays portal. Sometimes, these bundles can be more cost-effective than booking the flight alone. Alternatively, if you are flying from North America or Europe, book your flight to Santiago and your Santiago-to-Easter Island flight as a single "multi-city" itinerary. This often saves money compared to booking two separate, one-way tickets.

4. Join a Frequent Flyer Program

If you are a member of the **LATAM Pass** program, **American Airlines AAdvantage**, or **Delta SkyMiles**, check the award availability. Mileage redemptions on this route can be a phenomenal value, especially in business class, if you can find availability. The airlines are partners, so miles can often be transferred or used across programs.

5. Be Flexible with Your Stay

The limited flight schedule means your stay on the island needs to align with the flights. Most visitors plan for a minimum of 4 to 5 nights. This gives you three full days on the island, which is the absolute minimum to see the main

sites and get a feel for the culture. A week is ideal.

Entry Requirements and Important Paperwork

Before you even think about the gate, you need to have your documentation in perfect order. The Chilean government and the Rapa Nui community have strict rules to protect the island's environment and cultural heritage.

Passport and Visa

You need a valid passport with at least six months of validity remaining. Citizens of many countries (including the USA, Canada, the UK, Australia, and most of Europe) do not need a visa for tourism for stays of up to 90 days. However, check the latest requirements from the Chilean consulate in your home country, as policies can change.

The National Park Entry Fee

This is the most important document you will buy on the island. To enter the Rapa Nui National Park (which includes the Rano Raraku volcano crater, Orongo,

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and all the major moai sites), you must purchase a ticket. As of recent policy changes, **all travelers must pre-purchase their park entry ticket online** before arriving on the island. It is a multi-day pass, and you will need to show it at various checkpoints. The price is around \$80 USD per person. Do not lose it. It is your passport to the entire archaeological experience.

The Landing Card (Formulario Único de Ingreso)

On the flight from Santiago, the crew will hand you a special form called the "Formulario Único de Ingreso." You must fill this out accurately. It collects basic personal information, your accommodation details, and your flight number. This form is collected by immigration officials when you land in Mataverí. Keep the stub; you will need to return it when you leave the island.

Proof of Accommodation and Return Ticket

When you check in for your flight in Santiago, the airline will almost certainly ask to see proof of your accommodation on the island (a hotel

confirmation) and your return flight ticket. They are responsible for ensuring passengers do not get stranded, so have these documents ready in printed or digital form.

What to Expect After You Land: Arrival at Mataverí Airport

Stepping off the plane onto the tarmac at Mataverí International Airport is a moment of pure magic. The air is warm and humid, often carrying the scent of the ocean and the island's lush grasses. The airport itself is small, open-air, and charmingly simple.

Immigration and Customs

The process is generally smooth but can be slow if multiple flights arrive close together. You will have your customs form inspected and your passport stamped. Be prepared for a friendly but thorough check. Do not attempt to bring any fresh fruit, vegetables, seeds, or animal products onto the island. The local ecosystem is fragile, and biosecurity is taken very seriously.

How To Get To Easter Island Getting to Your Accommodation

The airport is located just outside the island's only town, **Hanga Roa**. Most hotels and guesthouses are within a 5 to 15-minute drive or a pleasant 20-minute walk from the terminal. Many accommodations offer a free pick-up service, so confirm this with your host before you arrive. Taxis are also available right outside the arrivals area. There are no car rental counters inside the terminal itself, but you can arrange a rental in advance or find a local operator in town.

The currency on the island is the **Chilean Peso (CLP)** and the **US Dollar (USD)** is widely accepted, though you will get change in pesos. There is a bank with an ATM in Hanga Roa, but it can run out of cash. It is wise to bring a reasonable amount of Chilean pesos in cash from Santiago.

Common Questions and Misconceptions About

Getting to Easter Island

There is a lot of misinformation floating around about travel to Rapa Nui. Let's clear up a few of the most common points of confusion that arise when researching **how to get to Easter Island**.

Can I Take a Cruise?

Yes, but it is not the same. Some luxury expedition cruise lines (like Ponant, Silversea, or Hurtigruten) include Easter Island as a port of call on their South America or South Pacific itineraries. This is a fantastic option for some, but it is extremely expensive, the time on the island is limited (usually one day), and you are tied to the ship's schedule. It is not a regular ferry service. For independent travelers, the flight remains the only reliable option.

Is It Safe?

Yes, Easter Island is considered very safe for travelers. The local community is friendly and welcoming. The main risks are environmental: sunburn, dehydration, and the strong, unpredictable winds. The most common

Can I Fly From the United States Directly?

No. There are no direct flights from North America, Europe, or Asia to Easter Island. You must fly through Santiago, Chile. There are no connecting flights through other South American cities like Lima or Buenos Aires that go directly to Easter Island.

What If I Miss My Flight?

This is a traveler's nightmare, but it happens. If you miss your flight from Santiago to Easter Island, LATAM will likely rebook you on the next available flight, which could be days later. There is only one flight per day. Your best bet is to have travel insurance that covers trip interruption and to arrive in Santiago at least one full day before your connecting flight to Rapa Nui.
