By 1825, Alto Peru became Bolivia, named in honor of Bolivar, who drafted its first constitution.

Critics saw it as autocratic; Bolivar argued it was necessary to prevent anarchy. Though never

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successfully implemented elsewhere, it reveals Bolivar's fear of fragmentation and dictatorship—a tension that defined his career.
