A Simple Bird

Draw a small circle for the head and a slightly larger oval for the body. Add a tiny triangle for a beak and a small dot for an eye. A small wing can be a simple curved shape. You can draw it sitting on a branch or just flying with simple lines for wings.

A Tortoise or Turtle

Draw a dome shape for the shell. Add a small rounded rectangle for the head sticking out from one side, and four small stumps for legs. A tiny line for a mouth and a dot for an eye. You can add a pattern on the shell using simple polygons or curved lines.

Category 3: Simple Nature Elements

Draw a simple irregular oval. Add a few curved lines to show cracks and texture. Drawing a small pile of rocks is a great exercise in varying shapes while keeping them simple. They are grounding and easy to replicate.

A Tiny Flower

Draw a small circle for the center. Around it, draw a series of small loops or simple petals. You can vary the number of petals: five for a simple flower, or many small dots for a wildflower style. Add a thin line for a stem and a small leaf.

Draw a tall, thin rectangle. Add a small oval on top for melted wax and a thin line for the wick. At the top of the wick, draw a teardrop shape for the flame. This simple icon is warm and evocative.

Draw a circle at the top (the bow) with a hole in the middle. Then, draw a straight line down (the shaft). At the bottom, add two or three small rectangles or bumps (the teeth). Keys are recognizable and fun to draw in different styles.

A Pair of Glasses

Draw two circles that are touching or connected by a small bridge. Add two lines extending outward on the sides for the arms. You can make them round, square, or cat-eye shaped. This is a two-minute sketch that looks very cute when completed.
