Anatomy of a Compound Light Microscope: The Parts You Need to Know

- **Coarse Adjustment Knob:** The larger knob usually located on the arm. Turning it moves the stage or body tube up and down quickly. It is

used for initial focusing at low power.

- **Fine Adjustment**

Knob: The smaller knob located inside or alongside the coarse knob. It makes tiny, precise movements to sharpen the image. It is essential for high-power focusing.

- **Stage Clips or Mechanical Stage:**

Stage clips hold the slide in place. A mechanical stage allows

you to move the slide in tiny increments by turning two control knobs.

- **Diaphragm or Condenser:**

The diaphragm is a rotating disc or a lever under the stage that controls the amount of light passing through the specimen.

The condenser focuses that light into a tight beam.
