Best Foods for the Endomorph Diet

Sample Meal Plan for an Endomorph

Meal Timing and Intermittent Fasting for Endomorphs

A 16:8 protocol (16 hours fasting, 8 hours eating window) can help control insulin levels and reduce overall calorie intake without restrictive dieting.
