He could shift seamlessly between the rollicking 6/8 of "The Irish Washerwoman" and the graceful 9/8 of "The Butterfly." What set Armstrong apart was his insistence on rhythmic precision—every bow stroke carried the dance impulse. He often said, "A jig is not just a tune; it is a conversation between the fiddler and the dancer's feet."

Armstrong's Signature Style: Technique and Innovation

Jig Campbell Armstrong developed a recognizable style that melded traditional ornamentation with modern phrasing. He employed **cuts**, **rolls**, and **crans**—common in Irish fiddling—but adapted them to the Scottish idiom. His left-hand technique was exceptionally clean, allowing rapid notes to ring clearly without muddiness. On his right hand, he used a combination of short, crisp bow strokes for articulation and long, smooth bows for lyrical passages.

One of his most influential innovations was the "Armstrong Lift," a subtle bowing pattern that emphasizes the second beat of a 6/8 measure, giving dancers an extra spring. This technique appears in his celebrated composition "The Ullapool Jig," a tune that has become a standard in sessions from Glasgow to Sydney. Armstrong also experimented with non-traditional time signatures, writing jigs in 12/8 and even 15/8, while maintaining the essential danceable feel.

Key Albums and Compositions

Armstrong's discography offers a deep dive into his evolution as an artist. His debut album, *Fiddle for the Hills* (1971), featured raw, energetic recordings that captured the spirit of Highland ceilidhs. Later works like *Jig in the Shadows* (1985) and *Campbell's Canon* (2004) showed increasing sophistication, incorporating piano, flute, and even string quartet arrangements. Below is a selection of his most influential compositions:

- ***The Ullapool Jig*** – A lively 6/8 tune that has become a session favorite worldwide.

Armstrong also mentored dozens of younger fiddlers, including notable figures like Lauren MacColl and Aidan O'Rourke, who credit him with expanding their technical and interpretative horizons.

In the educational sphere, Armstrong published three essential books: *The Jig Method* (1990), *Campbell Armstrong's Scottish Fiddle Tutor* (2001), and *Jig: From the Village to the Concert Hall* (2015). These texts break down bowing patterns, ornamentation, and phrasing in a clear, progressive manner. Many fiddle teachers still use them as core curriculum.

Armstrong's Role in the Folk Revival

The 1970s and 80s saw a powerful folk revival across the British Isles, and Armstrong was at its forefront. He performed at hundreds of folk festivals, including Cambridge, Sidmouth, and the Glasgow International Folk Festival. His television appearances on shows like *The Transatlantic Sessions* brought traditional jig music to millions of viewers. By combining academic rigor with populist appeal, Armstrong helped elevate the jig from a pub-floor dance to a respected art form.

Legacy and Continuing Influence

Since Jig Campbell Armstrong's passing in 2022, his influence has only grown. Younger fiddlers regularly cover his compositions, and several ongoing events celebrate his work. The annual **Armstrong Jig Festival** in Ullapool draws hundreds of musicians for a week of workshops and sessions. Additionally, the "Campbell Armstrong Archive" at the University of Edinburgh preserves his manuscripts, recordings, and correspondence for future researchers.

His music has also found its way into film and television. The tune "The Ullapool Jig" is featured in the soundtrack of the acclaimed documentary *The Highlands, A Love Story* (2023). Many contemporary composers cite Armstrong's approach to rhythm and melody as a direct inspiration for their own experimental folk works.
