

How To Ring America From Australia

Calling the United States from Down Under: A Complete Guide

Whether you are reconnecting with family, closing a business deal, or catching up with an old friend, the need to ring America from Australia is more common than ever. With modern technology and various telecom options, the process is simpler than you might think. However, without the correct information, you could end up dialling a wrong number, incurring unexpected charges, or struggling with poor connection quality. This guide walks you through every step, from the fundamental dialling codes to the cheapest calling methods, so you can connect to the United States with confidence.

Understanding International Dialling Basics

Before you pick up the phone, it is essential to understand the three key components of any international call: the **exit code**, the **country code**, and the **area code** plus local number.

- Exit Code (International Access Code):** From Australia, the standard exit code is **0011**. This tells your carrier that you are making a call outside Australia. Some VoIP or mobile providers may use a different code (e.g., 0015, 0018) but 0011 works for most landlines and mobile networks.
- Country Code for the United States:** The country code for the USA is **+1**. This applies to all states, including Alaska and Hawaii.
- Area Code and Local Number:** US phone numbers are ten digits (area code + seven-digit local number). For example, 212 (New York City) followed by 555-1234.

So, to ring America from Australia, your full dialling sequence looks like this: **0011 + 1 + (area code) + (local number)**. If you are using a mobile phone, you can replace 0011 with a + sign (press and hold the 0 key). Thus, **+1 212 555 1234** is perfectly valid and often easier to remember.

Step-by-Step Guide for Different Devices

Dialling from a Landline in Australia

- Dial **0011** (the exit code).
- Dial **1** (the US country code).
- Dial the **area code** (e.g., 212 for Manhattan).
- Dial the **seven-digit phone number**.
- For example: 0011-1-212-555-1234.

Note: Some older landline providers may require you to dial a specific prefix. Check with your carrier (Telstra, Optus, etc.) if 0011 does not work.

Dialling from an Australian Mobile Phone

Mobile phones simplify international dialling. The easiest method:

- Press and hold the **0** key until a **+** appears.
- Dial **1** (the US country code).
- Dial the **area code** and the **local number**.
- For example: +1 212 555 1234.

Using the plus sign ensures your call is correctly routed regardless of which Australian mobile network you are on. This is the most reliable method for smartphones.

Calling from VoIP or Internet-Based Services

Services like Skype, WhatsApp, Zoom, and FaceTime are popular alternatives for ringing America from Australia. These often bypass traditional telephony costs.

- WhatsApp/Zoom/FaceTime:** If both parties have the app and an internet connection, calls are free. Dial the contact’s US number directly within the app, often using the +1 prefix.
- Skype:** You can buy credit to call US landlines and mobiles at very low rates. Dial as you would on a mobile: +1 area code number.
- Google Voice (US-based):** While you cannot sign up for a US Google Voice number from Australia easily, if you already have one, you can make calls to US numbers for free or at low rates. Dial +1 and the number.

For business use, consider services like **RingCentral** or **Zoom Phone**, which offer virtual US numbers that Australians can call using local access numbers.

Cost Considerations When Calling the US from Australia

One of the biggest concerns is cost. Rates vary dramatically depending on your provider and the method you choose.

Included Minutes on Mobile Plans

Many Australian mobile plans now include **unlimited standard international calls** to selected countries, including the United States. Providers like Telstra, Optus, and Vodafone often have postpaid or prepaid plans that include US calling at no extra charge. Always check your plan’s fair use policy. If your plan includes this benefit, you can use the +1 method without worrying about per-minute fees.

Pay-As-You-Go Rates

If you do not have international inclusions, the cost per minute to ring America from Australia can range from 5 cents to 50 cents AUD, depending on your carrier. Check their international rate card. For occasional calls, a prepaid international calling card (dialling a local access number then the US number) might be cheaper than direct dialling.

VoIP and App-Based Calling

Always check the current time difference before calling. For example, when it is 7 PM in Sydney (AEST), it is 5 AM in New York (EST) — not a good time to ring.
- Wi-Fi Calling:** Enable Wi-Fi calling on your Australian mobile phone. This allows you to make calls over a Wi-Fi network, potentially reducing costs and improving reception, especially in areas with poor cellular coverage.
- Use a Stable Internet Connection:** For VoIP calls, use a strong Wi-Fi or 4G/5G connection. Avoid public unsecured networks for confidential business calls.
- Test the Number:** Before an important call, test the dialling sequence with a friend in the US to ensure you have the correct exit and country codes.
- Mobile International Roaming:** If you are physically in Australia but calling the US, you do not incur roaming charges. Roaming only applies if you are using your Australian SIM while travelling outside Australia.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- Forgetting the Exit Code:** Many people dial just 1 and the US number. From Australia, you must use 0011 (or +) first. Without it, the call may not connect, or you may connect to an Australian number.
- Omitted Area Code:** US phone numbers require the three-digit area code. Even if you think the number is local within the US, you must include the area code when dialling from overseas.
- Using 1 Instead of 0011:** 1 is the USA country code, not the Australian exit code. Do not dial 1 alone from Australia. You will likely get a recorded message saying "the number you have dialled is incomplete."
- Confusing Country Codes:** +1 is for the USA and Canada. If you want to ring Canada, the process is identical. But do not accidentally dial +44 (UK) when you meant +1.
- Ignoring Fair Use Policies:** Some "unlimited" international calling plans may throttle or charge extra if you make hundreds of calls per month. Read the fine print.

Alternative Ways to Ring America from Australia

Beyond traditional dialling, consider these modern options:

Virtual US Phone Numbers

Services like **Dialpad**, **Grasshopper**, or **Google Voice** (with a US account) allow you to get a US number. People in the US can call that number locally, and you can answer in Australia. You can also use the service to call US numbers at low rates. This is ideal for businesses wanting a US presence.

Calling Cards

Online International Calling Services

Websites like **Rebtel**, **Viber Out**, or **Talkatone** allow you to call US numbers using your computer or mobile app. Rates are often competitive, and you can top up with small amounts.

Q: What is the cheapest way to ring America from Australia?

Q: Why do I hear a busy signal or see "call failed" when I dial?

Q: Do I need to dial a different number for a US mobile vs. landline?

A: No. The dialling format is identical for US landlines and mobile phones: 0011-1-area code-number. However, some US mobile numbers may have a different area code from the physical location of the owner.
