Professional Summary

Open with a powerful 2-3 sentence summary that mentions your years of experience (including homemaking), a top skill, and the type of role you want. Example: *“Detail-oriented project manager and planner with 7 years of experience overseeing household operations, budgets, and scheduling. Proven ability to manage competing priorities and drive results through organization and communication. Seeking to leverage these transferable skills in an administrative role.”*

Skills Section – Your Superpowers

Group skills into categories. Use subheadings like **Management & Leadership**, **Communication & Negotiation**, **Financial & Budget Management**, **Operations & Logistics**. Example bullets:

- **Project Management:** Planned and executed family events, home renovations, and educational schedules for multiple children simultaneously.
- **Budgeting:** Managed household expenses up to \$5,000/month, reduced spending by 15% through negotiation and careful tracking.
- **Conflict Resolution:** Mediated disputes, maintained calm under pressure, and facilitated communication between family, school, and medical professionals.

Volunteer, Community & Leadership Experience

This is your secret weapon. List any PTA roles, church committees, neighborhood events, coaching, or nonprofit volunteer work. Treat these like jobs. Include dates, organization name, and bullet points. For instance: *“PTA Treasurer, Lincoln Elementary (2019–2023): Managed \$10,000 annual budget, created financial reports, and coordinated fundraising events raising \$3,000 per year.”*

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Formal Work Experience (if any)

Even if it's been 10 years, include relevant prior roles. Use a simple structure: job title, company, dates, and 2-3 bullet points focusing on achievements. Do not elaborate on the gap; simply list it. Employers know you took a break.

Education & Certifications

Include degrees, relevant coursework, and any recent certifications (online courses, CPR, etc.). This shows you stay current. Consider adding a line like "Currently pursuing Project Management Professional (PMP) certification" to demonstrate growth mindset.

How to Tailor This Sample to Your Situation

Don’ts

- Don’t list every single activity or minor role. Focus on the most relevant 3-5 experiences.
- Don’t forget to include technology skills. Many moms have used spreadsheets, scheduling apps, or social media – list those.

Beyond the Resume: Cover Letter and LinkedIn Tips

A strong sample resume for stay at home mom is only one piece. Pair it with a cover letter that briefly addresses your career break in a confident way.
