Common Suffixes

- **-ful** (meaning “full of”) – Examples: *helpful*, *playful*, *colorful*

- **-er** (meaning “one who” or “more”) – Examples: *teacher*, *bigger*, *faster*
- **-est** (meaning “the most”) – Examples: *tallest*, *brightest*, *fastest*
- **-ly** (meaning “in a certain way”) – Examples: *quickly*, *slowly*, *happily*
- **-ing** (used in present participles) – Examples: *running*, *playing*, *jumping*
- **-ed** (used for past tense) – Examples: *walked*, *jumped*, *helped*

Because suffixes often change the part of speech (e.g., adding *-ful* turns a noun into an adjective), practice with suffix worksheets also reinforces grammar concepts.
