How to Make Google Your Homepage on MacBook in Safari

Safari is the default browser on every MacBook, and for good reason. It is optimized for Apple hardware, offers excellent battery efficiency, and integrates deeply with macOS features like iCloud Keychain and Handoff. Changing your homepage in Safari is straightforward, but the exact steps depend on which version of macOS you are running. Below, we cover both the modern approach for recent versions and the classic method for older systems.

For macOS Ventura, Monterey, and Later (Safari 15 and Above)

1. Open Safari on your MacBook.
2. From the top menu bar, click **Safari** and then select **Settings** (or press **Command + ,**).
3. Navigate to the **General** tab.
4. Locate the field labeled **Homepage**. Enter the full URL: **https://www.google.com**.
5. Next to the homepage field, you will see a dropdown menu.

- Choose **New windows open with** and select **Homepage**.
6. For new tabs, you can similarly set **New tabs open with** to **Homepage** if you want every new tab to also show Google.
 7. Close the settings window. Your changes are saved automatically.

To test it, close all Safari windows and reopen the browser. You should see the Google homepage load immediately. If you previously had a different homepage set, the change takes effect instantly.

For Older macOS Versions (Catalina, Mojave, and Earlier)

1. Launch Safari and click **Safari** in the menu bar, then choose **Preferences**.
2. Click the **General** tab.
3. In the **Homepage** field, type or paste **https://www.google.com**.
4. Select the button next to **New windows open with** and pick **Homepage**.
5. You can also set new tabs to open with the homepage by choosing that option under **New tabs open with**.
6. Close the Preferences window.

A helpful tip: if you are already on the Google homepage and want to set it without typing the URL, click the **Set to Current Page** button in Safari's General preferences. This automatically populates the homepage field with the page you are currently viewing.

What If the Homepage Setting Keeps Resetting?

Occasionally, MacBook users report that Safari reverts to Apple's default homepage after restarting. This is often caused by third-party extensions or malware. To fix this, check your browser extensions by going to **Safari > Settings > Extensions** and disable any suspicious ones. Additionally, ensure your Safari is up to date by running macOS updates regularly. If the problem persists, reset Safari by going to **Safari > Settings > Advanced** and clicking **Show Develop menu**, then from the Develop menu select **Empty Caches**, then quit and reopen Safari.

How to Make Google Your Homepage on MacBook in Google Chrome

Chrome is the most popular browser globally, and its integration with Google services makes setting Google as your homepage almost intuitive. The process is simple and consistent across all versions of macOS.

Step-by-Step Instructions for Chrome

1. Open Google Chrome on your MacBook.
2. Click the three vertical dots (the menu icon) in the top-right corner of the browser window.
3. From the dropdown, select **Settings**.
4. In the left sidebar, click **On startup**.
5. Select the radio button for **Open a specific page or set of pages**.
6. Click **Add a new page**.
7. In the dialog box, enter **https://www.google.com** and click **Add**.
8. Chrome will now open Google whenever you launch the browser.

If you also want Google to appear when you open a new tab, Chrome offers a separate setting. By default, Chrome's new tab page shows a combination of Google search, recently visited sites, and personalized content. To make Google the only thing you see on new tabs, you can install a third-party extension like **New Tab Redirect** and set it to **https://www.google.com**. Alternatively, you can simply adjust your home button settings: go to **Settings > Appearance** and toggle on **Show Home button**. Then, enter **https://www.google.com** as the homepage URL. This adds a house icon next to the address bar so you can return to Google with one click.

Troubleshooting Chrome Homepage Issues

Sometimes Chrome may ignore your homepage settings, especially if you have a conflicting extension or a malware infection. First, check if any extensions are overriding your settings by navigating to **More tools > Extensions** and disabling them one by one. Second, run Chrome's built-in cleanup tool by going to **Settings > Reset and clean up > Clean up computer**. Third, if nothing works, reset Chrome entirely by going to **Settings > Reset and clean up > Restore settings to their original defaults**. This will preserve your bookmarks and passwords but remove problematic extensions and temporary data.

How to Make Google Your Homepage on MacBook in Mozilla Firefox

Firefox is beloved for its privacy focus and customization options. Setting Google as your homepage in Firefox is slightly different but equally simple.

Step-by-Step Instructions for Firefox

1. Open Firefox on your MacBook.
2. Click the three horizontal lines (menu icon) in the top-right corner.
3. Select **Settings**.

How to Make Google Your Homepage on

MacBook in Microsoft Edge

Edge has gained significant popularity on macOS due to its Chromium-based architecture, which offers excellent compatibility with Chrome extensions. Changing the homepage in Edge is very similar to Chrome.

Step-by-Step Instructions for Edge

1. Open Microsoft Edge on your MacBook.
2. Click the three horizontal dots (menu icon) in the top-right corner.
3. Select **Settings** from the dropdown.
4. In the left sidebar, click **Start, home, and new tabs**.
5. Under **Startup**, select **Open a specific page or pages**.
6. Click **Add a new page** and enter **https://www.google.com**.
7. To set a home button, scroll down to **Home button** and toggle it on. Then enter the Google URL.
8. Your changes are saved automatically.

Syncing Your Homepage Across Devices

If you use Edge on multiple devices, you can sync your settings including the homepage by signing in with your Microsoft account. Go to **Settings > Profiles > Sync** and ensure **Settings** is toggled on. This way, once you make Google your homepage on MacBook, it will carry over to your Windows PC, iPhone, or Android device seamlessly.

Opera is known for its built-in VPN and ad blocker, but changing the homepage is just as easy as in other browsers.
