4. **Join the center:** When the two color 1 strands meet in the middle, make a forward knot (or a backward knot, being consistent) to join them. This completes one chevron row.
5. **Repeat:** Continue this process with the next pair of outer strands, which will now be color 2. Each row will produce a V shape.
6. **Finish as before:** Tie off and trim when the bracelet is long enough.
