

How To Get An Australian Passport

Who Is Eligible for an Australian Passport?

Before you begin your application, you must confirm that you are eligible. Only Australian citizens can hold an Australian passport. Permanent residents and visa holders are not eligible. You must have proof of your citizenship, usually in the form of an Australian birth certificate or citizenship certificate.

Citizenship by birth – If you were born in Australia on or after 20 August 1986, you are automatically a citizen if at least one parent was an Australian citizen or permanent resident. For births before that date, citizenship is automatic regardless of parental status.

Citizenship by descent – If you were born overseas and at least one parent was an Australian citizen at the time of your birth, you may be eligible for citizenship by descent. You will need to apply for a citizenship certificate before you can apply for a passport.

Citizenship by conferral – Immigrants who have been granted Australian citizenship through the conferral process receive a citizenship certificate. That certificate is the primary document needed to apply for a passport.

Types of Australian Passports

Australia offers several types of passports depending on your travel needs and frequency:

- **Adult Passport (P Series)** – For applicants aged 18 and over. Valid for 10 years.
- **Child Passport (P Series)** – For applicants under 18. Valid for 5 years.
- **Senior Passport (P Series)** – Available for applicants aged 75 and over. Same as adult passport but with a shorter validity of 5 years if preferred.
- **Frequent Traveller Passport (P Series)** – Contains extra pages for those who travel often. Valid for 10 years for adults.
- **Emergency Passport (P Series)** – Issued abroad in urgent situations. Valid for a limited period, usually 12 months.
- **Diplomatic and Official Passports** – For government officials and diplomats. Available only through specific channels.

For most people, the standard adult or child passport is sufficient. If you travel extensively, consider the Frequent Traveller Passport to avoid running out of visa pages.

Step-by-Step Guide: How to Get an Australian Passport

Step 1: Gather Your Documents

The most critical part of learning **how to get an Australian passport** is preparing the correct supporting documents. The Australian Passport Office requires:

- **Proof of citizenship** – Full Australian birth certificate (not an extract), citizenship certificate, or previous Australian passport.
- **Proof of identity** – Current driver's licence, Medicare card, bank card, credit card, or other photo ID. You may need multiple documents.
- **Recent passport photographs** – Two identical colour photographs taken within the last six months. They must meet strict Australian passport photo standards (head size, expression, background, lighting).
- **Supporting documents for name changes** – If your name has changed since your last passport or birth certificate, you need a marriage certificate, change of name certificate, or deed poll.
- **Signatures and witness statements** – An adult Australian citizen who has known you for at least one year must complete and sign the guarantor section of your application form. The guarantor must not be related to you by birth or marriage and must hold a current Australian passport.

If you are applying for a child, both parents or legal guardians must consent. In some cases, only one parent may need to provide consent if the other is deceased or has sole parental responsibility.

Step 2: Complete the Application Form

You can apply online via the Australian Passport Office website or collect a paper form from an Australia Post outlet that offers passport services. Online applications are generally faster and allow you to track progress. For paper applications, you can download and print the form from the official website.

Fill in all sections accurately. Mistakes or omissions can delay processing. Ensure your name matches your proof of identity exactly. If you have a preferred name, you can include it on the application, but it must be consistent with your evidence.

When completing the form, you will need to provide details about your parents, your previous passport (if any), and your residential address. You will also nominate an Australia Post outlet where you will attend an interview (for first-time applicants) or simply lodge your documents.

Step 3: Get Your Passport Photos Taken

Visit an Australia Post outlet, a commercial photography studio, or use a DIY photo booth that meets the strict Australian guidelines. The photos must be colour, with a plain white or light background, and you must have a neutral expression with your mouth closed. No glasses are allowed if they obscure your eyes. The photo must show a clear, high-contrast image of your face from the crown of your head to the top of your shoulders.

Do not retouch or edit the photos in any way. If you are using an online application, you will need to upload a digital copy of your photo taken by a professional or from an approved app. The Passport Office recommends using an official Australia Post photo service to guarantee compliance.

Step 4: Have Your Application Lodged

For first-time applicants, you must attend an interview at an Australia Post outlet with your completed application form, your two passport photos, and all supporting documents. An Australia Post staff member will verify your identity and check your documents. For renewals, you may be able to mail your application if you are eligible, but in-person lodgement is often required for children and first-time adult passports.

During the interview, you will pay the application fee. Payment can be made by credit card, debit card, or cash (depending on the outlet). You will also provide your digital signature and have your photo taken again or confirm the one you submitted.

After lodgement, you will receive a receipt with your application reference number. Keep this safe – it allows you to track your application online.

Step 5: Track Your Application and Wait for Processing

Standard processing times for an Australian passport are typically 3 to 6 weeks from the date of lodgement, although this may vary during peak travel seasons or if your application requires additional checks. You can check the status online using your application reference number. If your application is delayed, you may be contacted for additional information.

For urgent travel, you can request priority processing at an extra cost. Priority processing can reduce the time to 2 business days if you meet the criteria (e.g., emergency medical treatment, death of a family member, imminent travel for work). You must provide evidence of the urgent need and pay the priority fee at lodgement.

Fees and Charges for an Australian Passport

Passport fees are set by the Australian government and are reviewed annually. As of 2025, the standard adult 10-year passport costs approximately AUD 325. Child passports (5 years) cost around AUD 165. Seniors may pay a reduced fee for the 5-year option. The Frequent Traveller Passport (extra pages) costs the same as a standard adult passport but with an additional fee for the extra pages.

Additional charges include:

- Priority processing fee (around AUD 110)
- Overseas processing fee (if applying from outside Australia)
- Lost or stolen passport replacement fee
- Name change fee if you are adding a name change after the original passport

Note that fees are non-refundable even if your application is refused or withdrawn. Always check the current fee schedule on the official Australian Passport Office website before you apply.

How to Renew an Australian Passport

If your current Australian passport is still valid or has expired within the last 10 years, you may be able to renew it without re-attesting your citizenship. The renewal process is simpler than a first-time application. You generally do not need to provide proof of citizenship again, but you will need your previous passport, a new photo, and the same identity documents.

Renewals can be done online or through a paper form. If your personal details have changed (e.g., marriage, divorce, change of name), you must provide supporting evidence. If your previous passport was a child passport and you are now 18 or over, you must apply as a new adult applicant (you cannot simply renew a child passport).

Children under 18 cannot renew their passport online; they must apply using a paper form with parental consent and attend an interview at Australia Post.

Replacing a Lost, Stolen, or Damaged Passport

If your Australian passport is lost or stolen, you must report it immediately to the Australian Passport Office. You can do this by phone or online. Reporting a lost or stolen passport automatically cancels it, preventing misuse. Even if you find it later, the cancelled passport cannot be reactivated and must be destroyed.

To apply for a replacement, you must complete a new application and pay the full fee. You will also need to provide a police report if the passport was stolen. If your passport is damaged (e.g., water damage, torn pages, bent cover), you need to apply for a replacement and explain the circumstances. The Passport Office may require you to submit the damaged passport as evidence.

How long does an Australian passport take to process?

Standard processing is 3 to 6 weeks. Priority processing (extra fee) can be 2 business days. Overseas applications may take longer due to shipping and local processing.

Can I get an Australian passport if I live overseas?

Yes. Australian citizens living abroad can apply at an Australian embassy, high commission, or consulate. The process is similar, but fees are higher, and processing times may be longer.

How do I check my passport application status?

Visit the official Passport Office website and enter your application reference number and date of birth. You can also call the Passport Information Line.
