Additional material was drawn from *Biarritz*, an 1868 antisemitic novel by Hermann Goedsche (writing under the pseudonym Sir John Retcliffe), which featured a scene of Jewish rabbis meeting in a cemetery to plan world domination. Goedsche himself was a plagiarist and former postal clerk who had been fired for forgery. Thus, the *Protocols* are a composite of lifted texts—a forgery of a fiction.

What Do the Protocols Actually Say? A Look at the Content

The *Protocols of the Meetings of the Learned Elders of Zion* consists of twenty-four “protocols” or chapters. Each outlines a different method of subverting Gentile society and consolidating Jewish control. The supposed “Elders” discuss using liberalism, democracy, capitalism, socialism, and the press as tools to weaken non-Jewish nations. They advocate for undermining religion, promoting moral decay, and fomenting economic crises. Key themes include:

- **Control of finance and media:** The Elders claim they will use their control over gold and the press to manipulate public opinion and bring governments to their knees.

- **Undermining traditional authority:** The Protocols advocate for the spread of liberal philosophies and atheism to weaken monarchies and the Church.
- **Use of secret societies and agents:** The Elders intend to infiltrate all levels of government and society, using Freemasons and other groups as unwitting tools.
- **Installing a Jewish king:** Ultimately, a Jewish ruler from the House of David would be placed on a global throne.

Reading the *Protocols* today, one is struck by its paranoid and self-contradictory nature. It simultaneously claims Jews are behind both capitalism and communism, both liberalism and tyranny. This flexibility is part of what makes the forgery so adaptable: it can be invoked to explain any perceived societal ill, regardless of the actual cause.

Exposing the Forgery: How the Protocols Were Debunked

Within years of their publication, the *Protocols of the Meetings of the Learned Elders of Zion* were exposed as a hoax. The most famous debunking came in a series of articles by London *Times* reporter Philip Graves in 1921. Graves demonstrated the extensive plagiarism from Maurice Joly’s *Dialogues in Hell*. He showed that the text was not a secret Jewish document but a crude adaptation of a satire written decades earlier.

Earlier investigations had also been conducted. In 1902, Russian journalist Mikhail Menshikov and others questioned the Protocols’ authenticity. After the Russian Revolution, emigré historian Sergei Nilus helped promote them, but legal challenges in the 1930s—such as the Berne Trial of 1934–1935—formally declared the document a forgery. The court in Berne, Switzerland, ruled that the *Protocols* were “a ridiculous falsification” and “plagiarism, obtained by a forgery.” Despite this legal verdict, the text continued to circulate, especially in Nazi Germany.

The *Protocols* have been cited by leaders from Gamal Abdel Nasser to Hamas militants.

In the West, the document is mainly circulated by neo-Nazis, white supremacists, and conspiracy theorists. It appears on far-right websites, is referenced by figures such as David Duke, and occasionally resurfaces in fringe political movements. The internet has given the *Protocols* new life, as digital copies are easily shared and repackaged.

Why Do People Still Believe the Protocols? Psychological and Social Factors

Despite overwhelming evidence of its fraudulent nature, the *Protocols of the Meetings of the Learned Elders of Zion* persist. This is due to several psychological and social factors:

1. **Confirmation bias:** People already inclined toward antisemitism find the document confirms their prejudices. They ignore evidence

of forgery and focus on parts that seem to "predict" modern events.

2. **Scapegoating:** The *Protocols* provide a simple explanation for complex problems. Economic crises, political instability, and cultural change can all be blamed on a hidden cabal.

4. **Lack of critical media literacy:** Many believers lack the skills to evaluate source credibility. They encounter the text on unvetted websites and accept it at face value.
5. **Cultural transmission:** In some societies, antisemitic tropes are passed down through generations, and the *Protocols* are part of that tradition.

Debunking Common Claims Found in the Protocols
