identity must be tested. She takes her responsibility to the kingdom and to her son seriously. She will not allow her son to marry someone who is not what she claims to be.

The queen's test in the **Princess and the Pea Hans Christian Andersen** can be read as a form of initiation, a ritual passage that the would-be princess must undergo to prove her worth. In many cultures, initiatory rituals involve discomfort, hardship, or ordeals that test the initiate's true nature. The queen's pea test fits this pattern perfectly. It is not a test of strength, courage, or

intelligence. It is a test of sensitivity, of refinement, of an inner quality that cannot be faked.
