## Classic Masterbuilt Smoker Recipes for Every Occasion

### 1. The Quintessential Smoked Brisket

This helps push through “the stall” and keeps the meat moist. Continue cooking until the internal temperature reaches between 200°F and 205°F (93°C-96°C) in the thickest part of the flat. Let it rest in a cooler for at least one hour before slicing against the grain. This recipe is a true test of patience, but the payoff is extraordinary.

### 2. Sweet & Smoky Baby Back Ribs

Ribs are a crowd-pleaser and one of the most rewarding **Masterbuilt smoker recipes** to master. Begin by removing the silverskin membrane from the back of the racks. This step is crucial for tenderness. Apply a generous layer of your favorite yellow mustard as a binder, then coat with a sweet and smoky pork rub. Let the ribs sit in the fridge for an hour. Smoke them at 250°F (121°C) using apple or cherry wood chips for a mild, sweet smoke flavor. After 3 hours, spritz the ribs every 30 minutes with a mixture of apple juice and apple cider vinegar. At the 4.5-hour mark, the internal temperature should be around 190°F (88°C). At this point, brush them with your favorite barbecue sauce and place them back in the smoker for another 30 minutes to set the glaze. The result is meat that pulls cleanly from the bone with a perfect sweet-and-smoky bark.

### 3. Perfectly Smoked Whole Chicken

Smoked chicken is incredibly forgiving and yields juicy, flavorful

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results. For this recipe, a 4-5 pound whole chicken works perfectly. Brining the chicken for 4-6 hours in a solution of salt, sugar, and water is highly recommended for maximum moisture. After brining, pat it dry and apply a dry rub that features paprika, garlic powder, onion powder, and a touch of cayenne for heat. Truss the legs and wings to prevent them from burning. Smoke the chicken at 275°F (135°C) using pecan or peach wood chips. The slightly higher temperature helps crisp the skin. Cook until the internal temperature in the thigh reaches 165°F (74°C). This usually takes about 3-4 hours. Let it rest for 15 minutes before carving. This is one of those **Masterbuilt smoker recipes** that showcases the versatility of your smoker beyond just red meat.

### 4. Smoked Salmon with a Brown Sugar Glaze

After curing, rinse the fillet and pat it dry. Let it sit in the fridge for an hour to form a pellicle (a tacky surface that helps smoke adhere). Smoke the salmon at 180°F-200°F (82°C-93°C) using alder or maple wood chips, which offer a delicate, sweet smoke. Smoking at a low temperature is key to preventing the fish from drying out. Smoke for about 2-3 hours, or until the internal temperature reaches 135°F-140°F (57°C-60°C) for a moist, flaky texture. In the last 30 minutes, brush on a glaze of maple syrup and a touch of Dijon mustard. These **Masterbuilt smoker recipes** for fish are a wonderful way to expand your smoking repertoire.

### 5. Smoked Mac and Cheese (The Ultimate Side Dish)

Form the mixture into a loaf shape on a foil-lined baking pan. Wrap the entire meatloaf in a lattice of bacon strips. The bacon adds fat and flavor, protecting the meatloaf from drying out. Smoke at 250°F (121°C) using hickory or mesquite wood chips. After about 2 hours, the internal temperature should be around 155°F (68°C). Glaze the meatloaf with a sweet and tangy Kansas City-style barbecue sauce and continue smoking until the internal temperature reaches 160°F (71°C). Let it rest for 10 minutes

## 7. Smoked Turkey for a Flavorful Feast

A smoked turkey is a magnificent centerpiece for any holiday or gathering. Use a 10-12 pound turkey and brine it overnight in a solution of apple juice, salt, brown sugar, and fresh herbs. Stuff the cavity with quartered apples, onions, and fresh sage. Smoke the turkey at 275°F (135°C) using cherry or pecan wood chips for a beautiful mahogany color and mild flavor. Plan for about 30-40 minutes per pound. The breast meat is done at 165°F (74°C), but many pitmasters prefer to cook the dark meat to 175°F (79°C) for better texture. ## 8. Smoked Pork Shoulder for Pulled Pork

Then, unwrap and shred the meat, discarding large chunks of fat. Toss with a splash of apple cider vinegar and your favorite BBQ sauce.
