Her series is a wild ride through the underworld of the galaxy, filled with insane droids, ancient relics, and double-crosses. For readers who love the thrill of Indiana Jones mixed with the dark comedy of the Star Wars universe, Aphra is a must-read. 4. Star Wars: The High Republic - Phase I & II

The High Republic publishing initiative is a massive multimedia project set 200 years before the Phantom Menace. Titles like *The High Republic: The Blade* and *The High Republic: Trail of Shadows* offer self-contained, beautiful stories.
