This changing pH means that no single cleaning solution works for every stage of the stain. Do not use hot water, as heat can help set the protein in the urine, making the stain permanent. Blot this water up with fresh towels immediately. This flushing step helps to remove any remaining surface urine and reduces the concentration of odor-causing compounds.

Step 3: Apply a Gentle, pH-Balanced Cleaner

DIY Solutions: Natural and Effective

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Methods

The Power of Enzymatic Cleaners

While technically a commercial product, enzymatic cleaners are often considered the gold standard for biological stains like urine. Check it after a few hours. The combination of oxygen, soap, and time can lift even the most set-in odors. Do not rub it in, as this can damage the carpet fibers.

Tackling Old, Set-In Stains and Odors

Old, dried stains present the greatest challenge in your mission for how to get cat urine smell out of carpet. The uric acid crystals have had time to bond deeply with the carpet and padding. In cases where the smell is extremely strong and the stain has been there for months, the urine may have soaked through to the carpet padding or even the subfloor. solution to penetrate all the way through the carpet and into the padding. Use a spray bottle or pour it directly onto the area. Let it soak for at least 15-20 minutes.

Step 3: Extract and Repeat

After the soak, use a wet/dry vacuum or a carpet cleaning machine to extract the dirty solution. If you do not have one, you can blot it up with towels, but you will not be able to get as much out. Extract as much moisture as you can, then repeat the process. Old, set-in stains often need two or three treatments to fully break down the uric acid crystals.

When to Consider Replacing Padding

If, after several deep cleaning attempts, the smell is still present, the urine has likely soaked through to the carpet padding. In this case, you may need to cut a small square of carpet out, replace the affected padding with a fresh piece, and then patch the carpet back. This is a more invasive step, but it is often the only way to fully resolve a deeply embedded odor. For many homeowners, this is the final, necessary step in learning how to get cat urine smell out of carpet for good.
