It is **toxic** if inhaled or ingested and should never be used for pest control, gardening, or any application where people or animals come into contact with it.

Important: Always inspect the label. Only purchase DE that is clearly marked “Food Grade” for home use.

When Using Diatomaceous Earth

Even food grade DE can be an irritant if mishandled. The microscopic diatoms have razor-sharp edges that can damage lung tissue if inhaled in large amounts. Follow these safety guidelines every time you use DE:

- **Wear a dust mask or respirator** – especially when applying dry DE indoors or in large areas.
- **Use safety goggles** to protect your eyes from airborne particles.
- **Keep DE away from children and pets while applying** – allow the dust to

settle before letting them back into the area.

- **Avoid creating clouds of dust** – use a gentle applicator or a squeeze bottle for precise applications.
- **Wash hands thoroughly after use** – DE can be drying to the skin.

The most popular use of DE is as a natural, non-toxic insecticide. When insects come into contact with the powder, it scratches their waxy exoskeleton and causes them to dehydrate and die. Here are detailed instructions for common

Using DE Against Ants, Cockroaches, and Silverfish

1. **Locate entry points and trails** – Look for cracks in walls, gaps under doors, baseboards, and along window sills.
2. **Apply a thin layer of DE** using a bulb duster or a small squeeze bottle. A light dusting that you can barely see is more effective than a thick pile, because insects will avoid large mounds.
3. **Reapply after rain or cleaning** – DE loses its effectiveness when wet. In dry indoor areas, it can remain active for weeks.
4. **Use in crevices** – For hidden areas, puff

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DE into wall voids and behind

appliances using a hand duster.

Pro tip: Mix DE with a small amount of powdered sugar to attract ants. The sugar draws them in, and the DE does the work.

How To Use Diatomaceous Earth for Bed Bugs

Bed bugs are notoriously difficult to eliminate. DE can be a valuable part of an integrated pest management plan:

- Remove all bedding and vacuum the mattress, box spring, and bed frame thoroughly.
- Using a fine brush or a dedicated duster, apply a very thin line of DE along the

seams of the mattress, inside the box

spring, and around the legs of the bed.

- Dust inside electrical outlets (remove the cover plate first) and along baseboards near the bed.
- Leave the powder in place for several days, then vacuum and reapply as needed.

Caution: Do not breathe the dust while applying. Wear a mask and keep the room well-ventilated.

Using DE for Garden Pests (Aphids, Slugs, and Worms)

In the garden, food grade DE is an excellent non-chemical defense:

1. **For soft-bodied insects like aphids** – dust the leaves of affected plants with a light coating. Best applied in early morning when dew is present, so the powder sticks. Reapply after rain.
2. **For slugs and snails** – create a barrier ring of DE around the base of plants. The sharp particles deter them from crossing.
3. **For soil pests** – mix a few tablespoons of DE into the top inch of soil to control fungus gnat larvae and other harmful soil inhabitants.

Remember that DE can also harm beneficial insects like bees. Avoid dusting open flowers where pollinators are active. Apply in the evening when bees are less active, and rinse the

next morning if possible.

Food grade DE is widely used by pet owners as a natural dewormer and flea controller. Always consult your veterinarian before starting any new health regimen for your animal.

Internal Use (Deworming)

For dogs and cats, the typical dosage is about 1 teaspoon per 10 pounds of body weight, mixed into wet food, once a day for a month. Follow the instructions on the packaging of your

3. Work the powder into the fur, focusing on the neck, back, and tail area.
4. Leave on for 30 minutes to an hour, then brush or rinse off. Do not leave DE on

Household Applications of Diatomaceous Earth

Beyond bugs and pets, you can use DE for many cleaning and organizing tasks.

Natural Odor Absorber

DE's porous structure makes it excellent at trapping odors. To freshen up a musty closet,

litter box area, or trash can:

- Place a small open bowl or a fabric sachet filled with DE in the space.
- Replace the DE every couple of weeks or when it becomes saturated.

Deodorizing Carpets and Rugs

1. Sprinkle food grade DE generously over the carpet.
2. Let it sit for several hours or overnight.
3. Vacuum thoroughly. The DE will absorb odors and moisture.

Note: Make sure your vacuum has a HEPA filter to trap the fine particles.

Silver Polishing

Mix a small amount of DE with water to make a paste. Rub gently onto tarnished silver or brass items, then rinse and buff dry. The mild abrasive action helps restore shine without harsh chemicals.

Food grade DE can be incorporated into DIY skincare routines because of its gentle exfoliating and absorbent properties.

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Facial Exfoliant Mask

1. Mix 1 part DE with 3 parts water (or aloe vera gel) to form a smooth paste.

Soil Amendment

Mixing food grade DE into your potting soil can improve drainage and aeration. The
