- **Rotary Switches:** A 12-position rotary switch can be used to select different frequency ranges or operational modes.
- **Capacitors and Inductors:** A selection of ceramic capacitors (100pF to 0.1uF) and a variable inductor (often wound on a ferrite core) help create resonant circuits that can be tuned to specific frequencies.

Signal Generation and Detection

- **555 Timer IC:** This is the workhorse of many homemade radionics machines. It can be configured to generate a wide range of frequencies from a few hertz to several kilohertz.
- **Transistors:** NPN transistors like the 2N3904 or BC547 can be used to amplify the signal. A simple two-transistor oscillator circuit is very effective.
- **LED Indicator:** A red or green LED with a current-limiting resistor provides visual feedback that the circuit is powered and oscillating.
- **Battery:** A 9V battery or a small 12V power supply is sufficient for most designs. Battery power is often preferred to avoid mains interference.

Step-by-Step Guide: How To Build Radionics Machine

Step 1: Prepare the Enclosure and Plates

Use silicone adhesive or small brass screws to secure the plates, ensuring good electrical contact with the ground wire.

Step 2: Assemble the Oscillator Circuit

The core of your radionics machine is an adjustable oscillator. The 555 timer IC is an excellent choice for beginners. Connect pin 1 to ground, pin 8 to positive voltage, and pins 2 and 6 together. Connect a 10kOhm resistor from pin 7 to positive voltage, and a 1MOhm potentiometer (wired as a variable

resistor) from pin 7 to pins 2 and 6. Connect a 0.1uF capacitor from pins 2 and 6 to ground. The output on pin 3 will now produce a square wave whose frequency is controlled by the potentiometer. This adjustable frequency is your "rate" control.

For a more sophisticated design, add a second 555 timer or a transistor buffer stage to shape the output wave into a smoother sine-like form. Many traditional radionics designs use a "rubbing plate" or "stick pad" as the primary interface, which creates a tactile feedback loop. The stick plate is connected to the output of the oscillator through a current-limiting resistor, allowing the operator to feel a slight tingle or resistance as they adjust the potentiometer.

Step 3: Wire the Rate Selectors and Switches

Wire your potentiometers in series or parallel, depending on the complexity you desire. A common configuration uses three potentiometers: one for coarse frequency adjustment, one for fine tuning, and a third for intensity or "broadcast power." The rotary switch can be used to select different capacitor values, effectively changing the frequency range of the oscillator. For example, position 1 might give you 1-100 Hz, position 2 gives 100-1000 Hz, and so forth. This allows you to cover a wide spectrum of rates useful for different types of treatments.

Step 4: Connect the Witness and Output Plates

The witness plate is typically connected to the input side of the circuit, often through a high-value resistor (10MOhm) to ground. This creates a sensitive impedance bridge. The output plate is connected to the output of the oscillator, usually through a series capacitor to block DC current. Some builders also add a small antenna (a simple telescoping rod or a coil of wire) to broadcast the frequencies more effectively into the environment. The antenna can be connected to the output plate through a switch so you can toggle between direct contact broadcast and remote broadcast.
