Sample Answer: "Yes, I am very comfortable with technology. In my last job, I learned a new point-of-sale system within my first week. I enjoy figuring out how software works and I am not afraid to ask questions if I get stuck. I understand that banks use specialized systems for security and efficiency, and I am eager to train on those platforms. I am also comfortable using spreadsheets and basic data entry tools."

6. How would you handle a situation where a customer asks you to break a policy?

Policies exist to protect both the customer and the bank. This question tests your ability to enforce rules while maintaining a positive relationship with the customer. The interviewer wants to see that you can say no respectfully.

Sample Answer: "I understand that customer requests sometimes fall outside of policy. If a customer asks me to do something I cannot do, I explain the policy in a straightforward way and apologize for the inconvenience. I try to offer an alternative solution if one exists, such as directing them to a

manager who might have the authority to make an exception. I always aim to be firm but kind, so the customer understands that I am on their side, even when I have to say no."

7. Why should we hire you over other candidates?

This is your chance to summarize your strongest qualities and make a memorable case for yourself. The best answers are specific and connect directly to the teller role.

Sample Answer: "I bring a combination of strong math skills, genuine customer service experience, and a proactive attitude toward learning. In my previous role, I was recognized for having the lowest cash discrepancy rate on my shift. I also enjoy helping customers and have been told I am approachable and patient. I am looking for a long-term career in banking, and I am motivated to grow with your institution. I believe my reliability and positive attitude would make me a valuable addition to your team."

Additional Teller Interview Questions You Should Prepare For

While the questions above are among the most common, you should also be ready for others that test your knowledge of banking basics, your availability, and your goals. Here are a few more teller job interview questions and answers you can adapt to your own experience.

- **What does excellent**

- **How do you prioritize tasks during a busy shift?** Emphasize staying calm, handling one transaction at a time, and knowing when to ask for help.
- **Do you have experience with cash drawers or balancing?** Be honest about your experience and highlight any related skills.
- **Where do you see yourself in five years?** Mention growth within the bank, such as moving into a head teller or personal banker role.
- **How do you stay organized?** Talk about checklists, routines, and your attention to detail.
