Frigidaire And Kenmore Wall Ovens Recalled By Electrolux: What Homeowners Need to Know

A major appliance safety announcement has sent ripples through households across the United States. Electrolux, the parent company of the Frigidaire brand, has issued a widespread recall affecting thousands of built-in wall ovens sold under the Frigidaire and Kenmore names. Electrolux received multiple reports of incidents, including units that showed visible signs of melting or smoking. While there were no reports of injuries at the time of the recall announcement, the potential for harm was significant enough to warrant a full-scale action. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) worked closely with Electrolux to coordinate the recall and inform the public. The **Frigidaire and Kenmore wall ovens recalled by Electrolux** include both single and double oven models manufactured over several years.

Which Models Are Included in the Recall?

Identifying whether your oven is affected is the first and most important step. The recall covers a broad range of models sold under both the Frigidaire and Kenmore brand names. Here is what you need to look for:

- **Brands:** Frigidaire, Frigidaire Gallery, Frigidaire Professional, Kenmore, Kenmore Elite.
- **Product Types:** Built-in single wall ovens, built-in double wall ovens, and some combination microwave-wall oven units.
- **Color Options:** White, black, stainless steel, and bisque.
- **Manufacturing Dates:** Units produced between January 2014 and July 2024.

Below is a list of specific model and serial number ranges that are confirmed to be part of the **Frigidaire and Kenmore wall ovens recalled by Electrolux**. You should check your oven's model and serial number against this list. The information is typically found on a rating plate located on the inside edge of the oven door or in the bottom drawer.

Important: Not every unit with the above model numbers is recalled. You must also verify the serial number. Serial numbers typically begin with letters such as **4E, 5E, 6E, 7E, 8E, 9E, 0E, 1E, 2E, or 3E**. If your serial number falls within the range 4E00001 to 3Z99999, your oven is likely affected. However, the exact range is best confirmed on the official recall website.

What Are the Specific Hazards?

The hazard is clear: the rear terminal block can overheat during normal use. This creates a fire hazard that could ignite the oven’s insulation or nearby combustible materials in your kitchen. In some reported cases, consumers noticed a burning smell or saw smoke coming from the back of the oven before a fire started. Because wall ovens are built into cabinetry, the risk of fire spreading to the surrounding wood structure is higher than with freestanding ranges.

Electrolux has received at least 170 reports of the terminal block overheating, with several reports of property damage. The **Frigidaire and Kenmore wall ovens recalled by Electrolux** are considered unsafe for continued use until the defect is corrected. If you own one of these units, you should not attempt to repair it yourself. The repair requires a qualified technician to replace the terminal block with an updated design that prevents overheating.

What Should You Do If You Own a Recalled Oven?

If you have confirmed that your wall oven is part of the recall, take the following steps immediately:

1. **Stop using the oven.** Do not cook, bake, or broil with it. Unplug the unit if possible. For hardwired wall ovens, switch off the circuit breaker that supplies power to the oven.
2. **Contact Electrolux** directly to register for a free repair. You can call their dedicated recall...

3. **Provide your model and serial number** when you call. The company will schedule a service appointment at no cost to you. A technician will inspect the oven and replace the terminal block with a safer part.
4. **Do not use third-party repair services** for this specific issue. Electrolux has authorized technicians who are trained to perform this repair correctly. Using an unauthorized service may void any future warranty or compensation.
5. **Keep records** of your communication with Electrolux, including confirmation numbers and service dates.

If you are unsure whether your oven is affected, you can also check the Electrolux recall lookup tool online by entering your model and serial number. The company has made the process as straightforward as possible to encourage swift action.

Electrolux and CPSC Response

The recall was announced jointly with the CPSC and Health Canada, as some units were also sold in Canada. Electrolux has stated that the safety of consumers is its top priority. The company is offering free repairs and has established a dedicated call center to handle the high volume of inquiries.

This recall is a reminder of how important it is for manufacturers to respond quickly when potential hazards are identified. Electrolux has committed to informing all known purchasers via email and postal mail. However, many wall ovens are installed in homes that have changed hands since purchase, so the company is relying on media coverage and public awareness to reach affected consumers. If you own a Frigidaire or Kenmore wall oven built between 2014 and 2024, even if you are not the original buyer, you are still eligible for the free repair.

Broader Implications for Kitchen Appliance Safety

This recall highlights a growing trend in the appliance industry: electrical failures in built-in ovens. Unlike freestanding ranges, which are easier to unplug or inspect, wall ovens are often hidden behind cabinetry and difficult to access. The terminal block issue in the **Frigidaire and Kenmore wall ovens recalled by Electrolux** is not unique—similar defects have prompted recalls from other brands in recent years.

Homeowners should regularly inspect their appliances for signs of trouble, such as unusual smells, discoloration on walls or backsplashes, or tripping circuit breakers. - **Check the bottom drawer.** For some double ovens, the tag is inside the warming drawer or on the bottom of the oven cavity.
- **Look at the back of the oven.** If you can safely pull the oven out slightly (for hardwired units, turn off power first), the serial number might be on the back panel.

Once you have the model and serial number, write them down. You will need them when calling Electrolux or using the online verification tool.

Tips for Preventing Appliance-Related Fires

While this recall addresses a specific defect, it is always wise to follow general safety practices for your kitchen appliances:

- **Never leave the oven unattended** when broiling or self-cleaning, as these modes generate the highest temperatures.
- **Keep flammable items** such as paper towels, oven mitts, and plastic containers away from the oven.
- **Replace any appliance** that shows signs of electrical damage, such as frayed wires or scorch marks.
- **Install a smoke detector** in your kitchen and test it monthly.
- **Have a fire extinguisher** in or near the kitchen. Ensure it is rated for electrical fires (Class C).
