Finally, unscrew the old wall plate from the wall.

Step 3: Prepare the Wall

If your old thermostat left a large hole or an uneven surface, patch it with spackling compound and let it dry. You want a clean, flat surface for the new thermostat base. If you are mounting the base on a freshly painted wall, make sure the paint is fully cured before attaching the base. Position the new base so that it is level and the wires come through the center opening. Use the included screws and anchors (if needed) to secure the base to the wall. Do not overtighten the screws, as this could crack the plastic base.

Step 4: Understand the Terminal Labels

The Chronotherm IV Plus uses standard thermostat wire labels. Familiarize yourself with these common designations:

- **R** (or RC/RH): Power from the transformer. Usually a red wire.
- **W** (or W1/W2): Heat control. Usually a white wire.
- **Y** (or Y1/Y2): Cooling control. Usually a yellow wire.
- **G**: Fan control. Usually a green wire.
- **C**: Common wire, provides continuous power to the thermostat. Often a blue or black wire.
- **O/B**: Used for heat pump reversing valves.

Consult the manual that came with your Chronotherm IV Plus for the exact terminal configuration. The labels on the base will match the wires you removed from your old thermostat.

Step 5: Connect the Wires

It should click securely. If your model uses screws to fasten the body to the base, install those now. Insert the batteries if your model requires them. The Chronotherm IV Plus often uses two AA batteries as a backup power source even when a C wire is present.

Step 7: Restore Power and Test

If everything responds correctly, your installation is a success.

Programming the Chronotherm IV Plus for Maximum Efficiency

After installation, the next step is programming. The Chronotherm IV Plus allows you to set up to four periods per day: Wake, Leave, Return, and Sleep. Each period has a temperature setpoint for both heat and cool. Spend some time configuring these periods to match your family’s routine.

Setting a Simple Schedule

Press the "Set Schedule" button on your thermostat. Use the "Day" button to select the day you want to program. For weekdays, you might set a Wake period at 6:00 AM with a heat setpoint of 68°F (20°C). Set the Leave period at 8:00 AM with a lower setpoint of 62°F (16.5°C) to save energy while everyone is away. Program the Return period at 5:00 PM to bring the temperature back up to 68°F, and finally a Sleep period at 10:00 PM with a setpoint of 65°F (18°C). Repeat the process for weekend days if your schedule differs. The thermostat will automatically follow these settings, adjusting your home’s temperature without any further input from you.

Troubleshooting Common Installation Issues
