Step-by-Step Guide to

Creating Little Red Riding Hood

Red Riding Hood is the star of the show, and her puppet should be cheerful and recognizable.

1. **Prepare the Bag:** Place the paper bag flat on your work surface with the bottom flap (the part that creates the mouth) facing up and folding down toward you.
2. **Create the Face:** Cut an oval shape from pink or beige construction paper for the face. Glue this to the upper half of the bag, above the mouth flap.
3. **Add the Eyes and Mouth:** Glue on googly eyes, or draw them with a marker. Draw a small smile or a rosy cheek on the lower flap (the puppet's mouth). When you move the flap, the character will appear to talk.
4. **Make the Hair:** Cut short lengths of yellow or brown yarn. Glue these around the top and sides of the face to create hair. You can braid two pieces of yarn for pigtails.

5. **The Little Hood:** Cut a large triangle or hood shape from red construction paper. It should be wide enough to drape over the top of the head. Glue it in place, allowing it to frame the face. You can add a small ribbon tie under the chin.

6. **Dress the Puppet:** The body of the bag becomes the dress. You can color it with markers or glue on a piece of fabric or paper to look like a cape or a dress. Add small hands (cut from paper) to the sides of the bag if you like.

Bringing the Big Bad Wolf to Life

The wolf is the antagonist, but he can be made to look funny or scary, depending on the child's preference.

1. **Base Color:** You can use a brown paper bag as is, or color the entire bag grey or black with a marker or paint.
2. **Facial Structure:** Cut a wide, pointy snout from grey construction paper. Glue it to the upper half of the bag, so the point extends upward. The lower jaw will be the mouth flap.
3. **Sharp Features:** Draw or glue on a black nose at the tip of the snout. Add two pointed ears on top of the head.
4. **Dangerous Details:** This is the fun part. Cut small, white triangles for teeth and glue them to the top and bottom of the mouth area. Glue on large, yellow or red googly eyes to

give the wolf a wild look.

5. **Fur and Texture:** Glue on bits of grey yarn, cotton balls, or grey craft fur to the sides of the head and the body to make the wolf look shaggy. Draw on claws on the sides of the bag.

Making Grandma and the Woodsman

To complete the cast, these two characters are essential for a full story retelling.

Grandma: This puppet is a great opportunity for gentle character work. Use a beige or pink bag. Give her white yarn hair, a pair of wire-rimmed glasses (made from pipe cleaners or drawn on), and a frilly collar or apron. A small bonnet made from a piece of fabric or doily completes the look. Keep her expression soft and kind.

The Woodsman: This character is often the hero of the story. Use a standard brown bag. Give him a stern but kind face. A key feature is his axe. You can draw an axe on cardboard or construction paper and glue it to his hand (attached to the side of the bag). Add a flannel shirt pattern by drawing red and black lines on the bag body. Give him a dark beard made from construction paper or yarn.
