Mastering Search Strategies for the JCU Library Database

Boolean Operators

Boolean operators are simple words used to connect or exclude search terms. **AND** narrows a search by requiring all terms to appear (e.g., "climate change AND coral reef"). **OR** broadens a search by finding any of the terms (e.g., "adolescent OR teenager OR

youth"). **NOT** excludes terms (e.g., "renewable energy NOT solar"). Using these operators correctly can dramatically improve the precision of your results.

Phrase Searching and Truncation

Enclosing a phrase in quotation marks, such as "tropical marine biology," tells the database to search for those words in that exact order. Truncation, using an asterisk (*), allows you to search for multiple word endings simultaneously. For example, "environ*" will return results containing environment, environmental, environmentally, and environmentalism. This technique is especially useful when you want to capture all variations of a root word.

Using Filters and Limiters

After you perform a search, take advantage of the filters available in the interface. You can limit results by publication date to ensure you are using the most current research. Peer-review filters restrict results to scholarly journals only. You can also filter by language, geographic region, or publication type. For systematic reviews or meta-analyses, there are specific filters that target these study designs directly.

Saving and Citing Your Sources

Most databases within the JCU Library Database platform allow you to save articles to a personal folder, create alerts for new publications on your topic, and export citations directly into reference management tools like **EndNote**, **Zotero**, or **Mendeley**. Digital copies usually arrive within a few days.

Access Problems Off-Campus

If you are unable to access the database from off campus, ensure you are logged in to the library portal before clicking on any database links. Clearing your browser cache or trying a different browser can also resolve login issues. If problems persist, contact the library help desk for assistance.
