Unboxing and First Charge

The manual warns against using non-GoPro chargers and recommends charging via the provided USB cable connected to a computer or a 1A wall adapter. The HERO4 Session charges via a micro-USB port built into the camera.

Inserting a microSD Card

The manual specifies that the HERO4 requires a microSD, microSDHC, or microSDXC card with a minimum class 10 or UHS-I rating. For 4K video, a UHS-I card with 30MB/s write speed is recommended. The manual also provides a link to a list of approved memory cards, which is still helpful to avoid corruption issues.

Navigating the Menus

The HERO4 Black uses a small monochrome LCD on the front and two physical buttons: the Power/Mode button and the Shutter/Select button. The

manual provides a clear diagram showing how to toggle between modes (Video, Photo, Burst, Time-Lapse) and adjust settings like resolution, field of view (FOV), and Protune. For the Silver, the touchscreen simplifies this: swipe left and right to change modes, tap icons to adjust settings. 4K and 1080p Options

The **GoPro Hero 2014 Manual** dedicates several pages to video resolution and frame rate combinations. For the Black model, notable options include:

- 4K (3840 x 2160) at 15fps (standard) or 12.5fps (PAL) – great for cinematic time-lapses but with limited slow-motion flexibility.
- 2.7K at 30fps and 24fps – a good balance between resolution and frame rate.
- 1080p up to 120fps (Black) or

The manual explains that higher resolutions reduce the maximum frame rate. It also advises on which setting to use for different scenarios: 4K for stationary shots, 1080p 60fps for general action, and 720p 240fps for capturing fast movements like a skateboard trick or a splash.

Field of View (FOV) Settings

Another critical section covers the FOV: Wide, Medium, Narrow, and (on some

models) SuperView. The manual shows sample images comparing each FOV. Wide captures the largest area but introduces barrel distortion; Medium reduces distortion; Narrow is similar to a telephoto lens. For activities like skiing or mountain biking, Wide or SuperView is recommended to capture the entire scene. For interview-style vlogging, Narrow or Medium can reduce the fisheye effect on faces.

Protune: Advanced Control

The manual introduces Protune, GoPro's manual control mode. Enabling Protune unlocks settings for Color Profile (GoPro Color vs Flat), ISO Limit, Shutter Speed,

White Balance, and Sharpness. The **GoPro Hero 2014 Manual** explains that using Flat color profile and lower sharpness gives more flexibility in post-production. It warns that high ISO values (e.g., 1600) introduce noise, so a low ISO limit with adequate light is best. This section is gold for aspiring filmmakers who want to match footage from different cameras.

Photo and Time-Lapse Modes

Single Photo and Burst

The HERO4 can capture 12-megapixel

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stills at up to 30 photos per second in burst mode. The manual recommends burst for fast action, like capturing the perfect moment during a race. For single photos, the manual suggests using the Wi-Fi Remote or the Smart Remote (sold separately) to trigger the shutter from a distance, reducing camera shake.

Time-Lapse and Night Lapse

The **GoPro Hero 2014 Manual** explains how to set time-lapse intervals (0.5s, 1s, 2s, 5s, 10s, 30s, 60s) and how to use Night Lapse for long exposures at night. It includes a table of recommended intervals: for a sunset, use 5 seconds; for a star trail, use 60 seconds (with the

Night Lapse mode). The manual also advises mounting the camera on a tripod for time-lapse to avoid jitter.

Using the GoPro App and Wi-Fi

One of the most user-friendly features of the HERO4 is the built-in Wi-Fi and Bluetooth, allowing you to control the camera with the GoPro App (now called Quik). The manual provides step-by-step instructions to pair the camera with a smartphone:

1. Turn on the camera and press the Wi-Fi button (on the side of the

Black model; for Silver it's in the settings).

2. Open Wi-Fi settings on your phone and connect to the camera's network (password is printed on the camera or in the manual).
3. Open the GoPro App and follow the prompts.

The manual highlights that the app allows you to see a live preview, change settings, start/stop recording, and even download photos and videos. For the HERO4 Session, the app is practically necessary because the camera has no display.

Mounting and Accessories

The **GoPro Hero 2014 Manual** dedicates a section to recommended mounts: the adhesive mounts for helmets, the curved and flat adhesive pads, the handlebar mount for bikes, the head strap, and the chest mount. It includes diagrams showing proper orientation and tightness. The manual advises attaching the camera securely and double-checking before dropping into water or onto pavement.

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Underwater Housing

The HERO4 comes with a standard housing (for Black and Silver) that is waterproof to 40 meters (131 feet). The manual explains how to insert the camera properly, close the latch until it clicks, and check the seal for debris. It also warns against pressing the buttons while underwater beyond the rated depth, as pressure can cause leakage.

Firmware Updates

Though the camera is older, the manual still describes how to update the firmware using a microSD card. This process ensures compatibility with

newer memory cards and fixes bugs. The manual directs users to the GoPro website to download the latest firmware (which is still available for the HERO4).

Troubleshooting Common Issues
