Another: Category “Thing,” board after RSTLNE: “_ R _ _ _ _ E.” Pick consonants F, L, P and vowel O. Board: “P R O _ _ L E.” The missing consonant is likely “B” or “F” but B not chosen. “PROBLEM” fits perfectly. So solution is “Problem.” The key was recognizing the “-BLE” ending pattern.

These examples show how methodical letter selection and quick pattern recognition lead to success.

Mastering the “Before and After” Category
