5. Bashful – The Shy and Blushing Sweetheart

Bashful is easily identifiable by the way he hides his face or twists his body in shyness. He wears a green tunic with a red vest and a yellow cap. His cheeks are always flushed, and he often looks down or covers his eyes with his hands. In the film, he is the dwarf who is most afraid of but also most charmed by Snow White.

7. Dopey – The Mute and Childlike Dwarf

Dopey is the most beloved dwarf among many fans. He is the only one who does not speak—he communicates through clownish gestures and expressions. In images, Dopey wears a baggy green tunic with a large orange cap that is too big for his head, often covering one eye. He has no beard, which makes him look younger and more innocent than the others. His ears are large and stick out prominently.

In nearly every set of **pictures of the 7 dwarfs and names**, Dopey is the one doing something silly: making a funny face, balancing on one foot, or tripping over his own feet. His childlike curiosity and joyful clumsiness make him the heart of the group. The History Behind the Names

The list of names—Doc, Grumpy, Happy, Sleepy, Bashful, Sneezy, and Dopey—was finalized after extensive brainstorming by the Disney studio. Early drafts of the script included names like “Jump,” “Jolly,” and “Peevish,” but the team settled on the seven we know today because they were simple and expressed one clear trait each. Dopey was nearly called “Deaf” or “Dopey” from the start, and the latter stuck because it captured his slow-witted but lovable nature.

Interestingly, in some non-English versions of the story, the dwarfs have different names. For instance, in German, they are often called Chef (Doc), Brummbär (Grumpy), Happy, Schlafmütz (Sleepy), Pimpel (Bashful), Hatschi (Sneezy), and Tüpfel (Dopey).
