Method 1: Using the Manual Code Search

The simplest method does not require you to know a specific code at all. This is called the "Auto Code Search" or "Manual Code Search." It works by having the remote cycle through thousands of codes in its memory until it finds one that works for your device. Here is how to do it:

1. Turn on the device you want to program (e.g., your TV) manually.
2. Press and hold the **SETUP** button on the remote until the red light stays on.

This method is extremely effective and does not require you to look up any **Ge Universal Remote Rc 24914 E Codes** at all. It is often the fastest way to get your remote working.

Method 2: Entering a Specific E Code

If you know the exact code for your brand and device model, you can enter it directly. This is often more accurate than the code search method. You can find these codes in the original instruction manual, on the GE Universal Remote website, or on trusted third-party remote code databases. To enter a code directly:

1. Turn on your device manually.
2. Press and hold the **SETUP** button until the red light stays on.

Troubleshooting Common Programming Issues

Even with the correct codes, you might run into some issues. Here are the most common problems and how to solve them.

Problem: The Code Search Doesn't Find Any Working Code

If you have cycled through the entire code search and your device never responded, there are a few things to check. First, ensure the batteries in your remote are fresh. Weak batteries can cause signal issues. Second, make sure there is a clear line of sight between the remote and your device. Remove any obstructions. Third, check if your device is an older or less common model. Some niche brands are not supported. If all else fails, you may need to contact GE customer support with your device's make and model.

Problem: The Remote Powers On My TV but Won't Change the Volume

This is a classic sign that you have a code that is partially correct, but not the best code for your device. The volume function is often controlled by a different command set. Try repeating the code search. When your device turns off, do not stop pressing the **POWER** button. Continue pressing it. Your device will likely turn back on. Keep pressing **POWER** until it turns off again. This may indicate a different code. Stop on the code that turns it off and test the volume. If it works, you have found a better code. If not, continue the search.

Problem: The Remote Works for Some Buttons But Not Others

This also indicates a partially correct code. The remote has found a code that operates the basic functions, but a different code in the library is a better match for your specific device. You should run the code search again. When your device turns off, make a note of that code. Then, let the search continue. When it turns off a second time, test the remote. The second or third code found is often

more complete.

Problem: The Red Light Stays On and Won't Turn Off

If the red light on the remote remains solid and does not respond to button presses, the remote may be stuck in setup mode. Remove the batteries for 30 seconds and then reinsert them. This will clear the memory and reset the remote. You will need to reprogram all your devices from scratch.
