- Check:** Monday: $15(1.71) + 20(0.71) = 25.65 + 14.20 = 39.85$ (close to 40, rounding). The exact check: $15(12/7) + 20(5/7) = 180/7 + 100/7 = 280/7 = 40$. Correct.
