- Brake fluid and power steering fluid:** No fixed interval given, but the manual urges regular inspection.

Following these intervals can significantly extend the life of your Explorer. The manual also provides detailed instructions for checking fluids, such as the proper way to read the transmission dipstick (engine idling, in Park, on level ground).
