

How To Get Lucky Egg In Pokemon Emerald

Mastering the Art of Experience: A Complete Guide on How To Get Lucky Egg In Pokemon Emerald

Every seasoned Pokémon Trainer knows that leveling up your team is the backbone of a successful journey through the Hoenn region. Whether you are preparing to take on the Elite Four, breeding competitive Pokémon, or simply want to evolve your favorite creatures faster, one item stands above all others: the Lucky Egg. This precious held item boosts the Experience Points (EXP) your Pokémon earns from battle by a whopping 50%. But unlike the modern games where the Lucky Egg is often given as a gift, **Pokémon Emerald** makes you work for it. If you have been wondering **how to get Lucky Egg in Pokemon Emerald**, you have come to the right place. In this guide, we will uncover the legitimate methods, the best hunting spots, and some advanced tips to secure this rare item without resorting to cheating devices.

What Is the Lucky Egg and Why Is It So Valuable?

Before diving into the acquisition methods, let us understand what makes the Lucky Egg a must-have item. When a Pokémon holds a Lucky Egg, every defeated opponent yields 1.5 times the usual EXP. For trainers who grind levels repeatedly — especially in the post-game or when training multiple team members — this item cuts training time almost in half. In Emerald, where the level curve can be steep after the seventh gym, the Lucky Egg is invaluable. You can also pass the Lucky Egg between Pokémon via the Item storage system, so you only ever need one to benefit your entire roster.

The catch? **In Pokemon Emerald, the Lucky Egg is not handed to you by any NPC.** Unlike in Pokémon FireRed and LeafGreen, where you receive one from Professor Oak after completing the Pokédex, or in later generations where it is a reward for certain quests, Emerald requires you to either catch a wild Pokémon holding it or rely on the Pickup ability. Let's break down each method step by step.

Method 1: Catching a Wild Chansey (The Primary Way)

Where to Find Chansey in Pokémon Emerald

The most reliable way to obtain a Lucky Egg is to catch a wild **Chansey** holding one. In Pokémon Emerald, Chansey appears in only one location: **the Safari Zone**. Specifically, you will need to enter the Safari Zone's Area 3 (the one with the long grass and several ponds). Chansey has a notoriously low encounter rate — roughly 1% to 4% depending on the specific area — and even when you find one, it only has a **5% chance of holding a Lucky Egg**. Combine those odds, and you are looking at a 0.05% to 0.2% chance per encounter of looting a Lucky Egg. Patience is key.

Step-by-Step Hunting Strategy

- Unlock the Safari Zone:** You must reach Route 121 (east of Lilycove City) and pay the entry fee. Make sure you have plenty of Safari Balls — at least 50 to be safe.
- Navigate to Area 3:** Walk straight from the entrance, pass the first area, and enter the second set of grass. You will recognize Area 3 by the tall grass patches and the presence of water. Chansey appears in the grass, not in the water.
- Use Repels (Optional but Recommended):** Bring a Pokémon at level 25 or lower leading your party; this will increase the chance of encountering Chansey (which appears at levels 25–27) because lower-level wild Pokémon are suppressed. However, note that in the Safari Zone, you cannot use Repels while walking — you must exit, use a Repel on the overworld, then enter. The effect lasts only 100 steps. Alternatively, you can just run around without Repels.
- Encounter Chansey:** Run through the tall grass. When a Chansey appears, you must catch it to check its held item. In the Safari Zone, you cannot use your own Pokémon; you can only throw Safari Balls, bait, or rocks. Use **Bait** first to make Chansey easier to catch (it lowers flee rate), then throw Balls. Do not throw rocks as they make the Pokémon harder to capture.
- Check the Held Item:** After catching a Chansey, open your Bag, go to the Pokémon menu, select the caught Chansey, and view its held item. If it is a Lucky Egg — congratulations! If not, you can release the Chansey or keep it for breeding (Chansey evolves into Blissey, an excellent special wall). Repeat until you succeed.

Important Notes About the Safari Zone Method

- Chansey can flee during the Safari Game. If it runs away, you lose that chance. Using Bait reduces flee rate.
- The held item is determined when the Pokémon is generated, so you cannot "save scum" before an encounter without reloading. However, you can save before entering the Safari Zone and reset if you waste too many Balls.
- Be prepared for a long grind. Many players spend hours here. Consider watching a show or listening to music to stay sane.

Method 2: Using the Pickup Ability (Passive Hunting)

How Pickup Works in Pokémon Emerald

If the Safari Zone grind feels tedious, you can instead rely on the **Pickup ability**. Several Pokémon in Hoenn can have this ability, including **Zigzagoon**, **Linoone**, and **Pachirisu** (the latter not available in Emerald). Pickup allows a Pokémon to find items during battle — after each battle, there is a chance (based on the Pickup Pokémon's level) that it will pick up a random item. The Lucky Egg is one of the possible items, but only if your Pickup Pokémon is at a certain level range.

Step-by-Step Pickup Strategy

- Catch a Zigzagoon or Linoone with Pickup:** You can find wild Zigzagoon early in the game on Routes 101, 102, 103, and others. Make sure its ability is Pickup (not Gluttony). You can check by opening the Pokémon summary.
- Level Up Your Pickup Pokémon:** In Pokémon Emerald, the chance of picking up a Lucky Egg starts when your Pokémon reaches **level 21**. The odds increase with level. The best chances are between levels 41 and 60. Specifically, at level 41+, the chance of a Pickup Pokémon obtaining a Lucky Egg is about 4% per battle (if a random item is found). But note: Pickup Pokémon have a 10% chance to find any item after a battle, and among the possible items, the Lucky Egg is just one of many. This method is less reliable but can be done while you are doing other things.
- Build a Team of Pickup Pokémon:** You can have up to five in your party (plus one battling Pokémon). Each has an independent chance to find an item. Having five Linoone at level 41+ will give you roughly 50% chance per battle that at least one Pickup item appears, and then a 4% chance that item is a Lucky Egg. Over many battles, you will eventually get one.
- Farm Trainer Battles or Wild Encounters:** The most efficient way is to repeatedly battle the Elite Four or wild Pokémon in high-level areas (like Victory Road). Each battle triggers the Pickup chance. Check your Pickup Pokémon after every few battles by opening the party menu and looking at their held items.
- Collect and Reset:** Once a Pokémon picks up an item, it will not pick up another until you take the item from it. So regularly empty their held slots. If you get a Nugget or a Full Heal, just sell or use them. Persistence will yield a Lucky Egg eventually.

Advantages and Disadvantages of Pickup

- Pros:** You can multitask; you do not need to engage in the Safari Zone minigame; you gain many other useful items along the way; it works well with a grinding routine for EXP.
- Cons:** The odds are still low; you need high-level Pickup Pokémon; it can take hundreds of battles; you cannot target the Lucky Egg specifically — it is pure luck.

Method 3: Trading from Pokémon Ruby or Sapphire (If You Have Access)

If you own a copy of Pokémon Ruby or Sapphire (GBA), you can trade a Lucky Egg from those games into Emerald. In Ruby and Sapphire, the Lucky Egg is also only obtainable from wild Chansey in the Safari Zone (same mechanics). However, there is a small difference: in Ruby and Sapphire, the **Pokémon Box RS** (a GameCube application) occasionally gives out Lucky Eggs as a reward for depositing Pokémon, but that requires extra hardware. The bottom line: if you already have a Lucky Egg in another Gen III game, you can trade it to Emerald via a link cable — just make sure you have completed the first Gym and have Poké Balls to receive the trade.

Advanced Tips to Increase Your Success

Using the Move "Thief" or "Covet" in the Safari Zone?

Unfortunately, you cannot use your own Pokémon's moves in the Safari Zone. You must catch the Chansey to inspect the item. However, once you leave the Safari Zone, if you have a Chansey in your box, you can take it to a move tutor (none for item removal in Gen III), but the only way to remove a held item is to either take it manually or trade. Since Chansey is caught with an item, you just take it from its summary. So catching is necessary.

Compounding with Compound Eyes?

The Compound Eyes ability (found on Nincada, Ninjask, and others) increases the chance of wild Pokémon holding items by 50% when the leading Pokémon has that ability. However, **Compound Eyes does not work in the Safari Zone** because you cannot use your own Pokémon in battle there. Outside the Safari Zone, Chansey does not appear wild in Emerald anywhere else. So Compound Eyes is useless here. Stick to pure luck.

Save Time by Using a Master Ball?

If you have not used your Master Ball yet, you could consider using it on a Chansey to instantly capture it without the Safari Zone's frustrating mechanics. But using a Master Ball on a common Pokémon like Chansey is generally a waste, as Master Balls are finite. Only do this if you are desperate and have a second Master Ball from a trade or cheat.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can I get multiple Lucky Eggs in Emerald?

Yes, you can catch multiple Chansey or rely on Pickup multiple times. There is no limit to how many Lucky Eggs you can hold. However, you only need one — the effect does not stack if one Pokémon holds two (impossible). You can transfer it between party members.

Is the Lucky Egg worth the effort?

Absolutely. If you plan to train a full team to level 100 or even just to level 60 for the Battle Frontier, the Lucky Egg reduces required battles by one-third. The time invested in obtaining it pays off quickly.

Can I get a Lucky Egg from wild Blissey?

Blissey does not appear in the wild in Emerald. Only Chansey appears in the Safari Zone. So do not bother looking elsewhere.

Conclusion

Knowing **how to get Lucky Egg in Pokemon Emerald** turns a frustrating grind into a manageable goal. Whether you choose to brave the Safari Zone, assemble a team of Pickup Zigzagoon, or trade from another game, the reward is a permanent boost to your training efficiency. The Safari Zone method is the most direct albeit time-consuming, while Pickup offers passive collection that can yield other valuable items along the way. Whichever path you take, remember that patience is a virtue — and once that shiny egg-shaped charm is in your bag, every battle thereafter becomes more rewarding. Now, go catch that Chansey, and may the RNG be ever in your favor!
