Problem: The child has mastered a concept and is now bored.

Troubleshooting Common Challenges
Solution: Challenge them with slightly more advanced material. If addition within 10 is easy, move on to addition within 20 or introduce simple subtraction. Keeping the material fresh is key to maintaining engagement.
