

How Do I Make Google My Homepage On Safari

Step-by-Step Guide: Making Google Your Homepage on Safari for Mac

Let us start with the most common scenario: setting Google as your homepage in Safari on a Mac. The process is straightforward, but Apple has changed the settings panel in recent versions of macOS, so follow carefully based on your operating system version.

For macOS Ventura, Monterey, and Later Versions

If you are running macOS Ventura (13.0) or later, the settings for Safari are located in the System Settings app rather than within Safari itself. Here is how to proceed:

1. Open Safari on your Mac. You do not need to be on any specific page to begin.
2. Click on the **Safari** menu in the top-left corner of your screen, next to the Apple logo.
3. Select **Settings** from the dropdown menu. Alternatively, you can press **Command + ,** (comma) on your keyboard to open the same panel.
4. In the Settings window, click the **General** tab at the top. It looks like a gear icon.
5. You will see a field labeled **Homepage**. Click inside this field and type or paste: **https://www.google.com**
6. Below the homepage field, there is a checkbox that reads **Set current page as homepage**. You can ignore this if you have already entered the URL manually.

7. Look for the dropdown menu next to **New windows open with**. Click it and select **Homepage**. This ensures that every time you open a new Safari window, you land on Google.
8. Similarly, for **New tabs open with**, you can also choose **Homepage** if you want every new tab to start at Google. Alternatively, you might prefer to keep new tabs set to **Favorites** or **Start Page** for variety. This choice is personal.
9. Close the Settings window. Your changes are saved automatically.

Now, whenever you open a new Safari window, you should see the familiar Google homepage. Test it by closing Safari and reopening it, or by pressing **Command + N** to open a new window.

For Older macOS Versions (Big Sur, Catalina, and Earlier)

If you are using a Mac with macOS Big Sur (11.0), Catalina (10.15), or an earlier version, the process is slightly different because Safari preferences were still located inside the browser itself.

1. Open Safari.
2. Click **Safari** in the menu bar, then choose **Preferences**.
3. Click the **General** tab.
4. In the **Homepage** field, enter **https://www.google.com**.
5. Make sure the checkbox **Set current page as homepage** is unchecked unless you are already on Google.
6. From the **New windows open with** dropdown, select **Homepage**.
7. From the **New tabs open with** dropdown, you can also select **Homepage** if you wish.
8. Close the Preferences window to save.

That is all there is to it. The process is simple, yet many users overlook it simply because they do not know where to look. Once you complete these steps, the question **How Do I Make Google My Homepage On Safari** becomes a solved problem for your Mac.

How to Set Google as Your Homepage on Safari for iPhone and iPad

Apple's mobile browsers do not have a traditional homepage setting in the same way that desktop browsers do. However, you can achieve a very similar result by configuring Safari's Start Page and ensuring that Google loads first when you open a new tab or launch the app. Here are the steps for iOS and iPadOS.

Step 1: Check Your Search Engine Setting

First, make sure Google is set as your default search engine. This does not technically make it your homepage, but it ensures that when you type a query into the address bar, you get Google results.

1. Open the **Settings** app on your iPhone or iPad.
2. Scroll down and tap **Safari**.
3. Under the **Search** section, tap **Search Engine**.
4. Select **Google** from the list. A checkmark will appear next to it.

Step 2: Configure the Start Page

On an iPhone or iPad, the Start Page is what appears when you open a new tab. You can customize this page to show Google as the primary element, but you cannot make it a static URL. However, you can use a workaround that effectively makes Google your homepage.

1. Open Safari on your iPhone or iPad.
2. Navigate to **https://www.google.com** in the address bar.
3. Tap the **Share** button (the square with an upward arrow at the bottom of the screen).
4. Scroll down and select **Add to Home Screen**.
5. You will see a preview with the Google icon. Tap **Add** in the top-right corner.

This creates a shortcut on your iPhone or iPad home screen that looks like an app icon. When you tap it, it opens Safari directly to Google. While it is not technically a homepage setting, it functions

exactly the same way. You can even move this icon to your dock for quick access.

Step 3: Set Google as Your Start Page (Alternative Method)

In more recent versions of iOS and iPadOS, you can also set the Start Page to show your Favorites, and you can add Google to your Favorites for one-tap access. However, the Home Screen shortcut method is the most reliable way to make Google the first thing you see when you open Safari, especially if you close and reopen the app.

If you prefer that every new tab opens directly to Google, you can also try this: In the Safari settings under **General**, look for **Open New Tabs** and select **Start Page**. Then, in Safari, set your Start Page to show Google. However, Apple restricts the ability to set a custom URL for the Start Page on mobile. The Home Screen shortcut remains the best solution for iOS and iPadOS users who want to answer the question **How Do I Make Google My Homepage On Safari** on their mobile devices.

Troubleshooting Common Issues When Setting Google as Your Homepage

Even with clear instructions, things can go wrong. Sometimes Safari does not save your homepage setting, or it reverts to a default page after an update. Here are the most common issues and how to fix them.

Issue 1: The Homepage Setting Keeps Resetting

This can happen after a macOS or iOS update. Apple occasionally resets browser preferences during major updates. The solution is simple: repeat the steps for your device after the update completes. If the problem persists, check for third-party software that might be interfering. Some security suites or browser management tools can override your homepage. Disable them temporarily to see if that resolves the issue.

Issue 2: Google Opens as a Blank Page or Shows an Error

If Google appears blank or shows an error message, the problem is likely with your internet connection or DNS settings. First, check if you can reach Google in another browser. If you can, the issue is specific to Safari. Try clearing Safari's cache and cookies: go to **Safari > Settings > Privacy** and click **Manage Website Data**, then **Remove All**. This action will log you out of some sites but often fixes loading errors. If the problem continues, restart your device and check for system updates.

Issue 3: The Homepage Field Is Grayed Out

This is rare but can occur if you have a managed device (such as a school or work computer) with restrictions enabled. Check your **Screen Time** settings or consult your IT administrator. Personal Macs should never have the homepage field grayed out unless there is a configuration profile installed. To check, go to **System Settings > Privacy & Security > Profiles** (if it exists) and remove any profiles you do not recognize.

Issue 4: New Tabs Still Open to the Default Start Page

On a Mac, you have two separate settings: one for new windows and one for new tabs. Even if you set the homepage, new tabs might still open to the Start Page or Favorites view. Go back to Safari's General settings and make sure both **New windows open with** and **New tabs open with** are set to **Homepage**. On an iPhone or iPad, remember that the concept of a homepage is different. Use the Home Screen shortcut method described earlier for the most consistent experience.
