For example, consider the dataset: 3, 5, 7, 8, 9, 11, 14, 16, 22, 45. The first quartile Q1 is 7, the

third quartile Q3 is 16, and the IQR is 9. The lower fence is $7 - 13.5 = -6.5$, and the upper fence is $16 + 13.5 = 29.5$. The value 45 lies above 29.5, so it is a mild outlier. If we had a value of 60, it would likely be an extreme outlier. This method is intuitive and works well for skewed distributions, making it a standard answer to the question "in math what is an outlier detection technique."

The Standard Deviation Method

Another common approach uses the mean and standard deviation of the dataset. This method assumes that the data follows a roughly normal distribution. In a normal distribution, about 68 percent of data falls within one standard

deviation of the mean, 95 percent within two standard deviations, and 99.7 percent within three standard deviations. Values that lie more than two or three standard deviations from the mean are often flagged as outliers.

For instance, if a dataset has a mean of 50 and a standard deviation of 10, any value below 30 or above 70 would be two standard deviations away. Values below 20 or above 80 would be three standard deviations away. Many analysts use a threshold of 2.5 or 3 standard deviations as the cutoff for outlier detection.

However, this method has a significant weakness: the mean and standard deviation themselves are sensitive

to outliers. A single extreme value can pull the mean toward it and inflate the standard deviation, making it harder to detect that same value as an outlier. This is known as the masking effect. For this reason, the IQR method is often preferred for datasets that may contain outliers.

Visual Detection Methods

Sometimes, the simplest way to identify an outlier is to look at your data. Visual tools provide an immediate and intuitive sense of where extreme values lie. The most common visual tool for outlier detection is the box plot. A box plot displays the median, the interquartile range, and any points that fall outside the whiskers. Points beyond the

The modified z-score addresses this issue by using the median and the median absolute deviation (MAD) instead of the mean and standard deviation. The modified z-score is more robust to outliers and is a better choice when the dataset

may contain extreme values. A modified z-score greater than 3.5 is commonly used as a threshold for flagging outliers.
