Method 1: How To Get Street View On Google Maps Using a Desktop Browser

Using Google Maps on a laptop or desktop computer offers the most screen real estate and the most straightforward controls. This method is ideal for detailed exploration and planning. Here is how to access Street View on your computer.

Step 1: Open Google Maps

Navigate to **maps.google.com** in your preferred web browser. You do not need to sign in to use Street View, but signing in will allow you to save locations and access your timeline.

Step 2: Find Your Location

You can search for a specific address, landmark, or city using the search bar at the top left. Alternatively, you can manually pan and zoom around the map by clicking and dragging, or by using the plus (+) and minus (-) buttons in the bottom right corner.

Step 3: Identify Blue Roads and Lines

Once you have zoomed in close enough (typically to the city or street level), you will notice that many roads are highlighted in **blue**. These blue lines indicate that Street View imagery is available for that road. The thicker the line, the more comprehensive the coverage. Some areas also have blue circles, which indicate panoramic views of specific landmarks, such as famous buildings or natural features.

Step 4: Use the Pegman Icon

This is the most iconic method for learning how to get Street View on Google Maps. Look in the bottom right corner of the map screen. You will see a small yellow human figure, officially known as the "Pegman."

- **Click and Hold** the Pegman icon. The map will change to show all available Street View areas in a blue overlay.
- **Drag the Pegman** and drop it directly onto a blue road or a blue circle. The map will instantly switch to a full-screen Street View panorama.

Step 5: Explore the Street View

Once you are in Street View mode, the interface changes completely. You can now look around in all directions. Use your mouse to **click and drag** the image to pan left, right, up, and down. You will also see white arrows on the road surface. **Clicking these arrows** will move you forward along the street, simulating walking or driving. You can also click on the road itself to jump to that spot.

To exit Street View, simply click the "Back" arrow in the top left corner of the Street View window, or press the "Escape" key on your keyboard.

Method 2: How To Get Street View On Google Maps Using the Mobile App (Android and iOS)

The mobile app version of Google Maps makes Street View incredibly convenient for on-the-go exploration. Whether you are using an Android phone or an iPhone, the process is almost identical. This is especially useful for previewing a destination while you are traveling.

Step 1: Open the Google Maps App

Ensure you have the latest version of the Google Maps app installed from the Google Play Store or Apple App Store. Open the app on your device.

Step 2: Search for or Drop a Pin

Use the search bar at the top to enter an address or place name. Alternatively, you can long-press (tap and hold) on any spot on the map. This will drop a red pin at that precise location.

Step 3: Tap the Location Marker or Place Card

After dropping a pin or selecting a search result, a small information card, known as a "place card," will appear at the bottom of your screen. This card contains the name of the location, its address, and a star rating if applicable.

Step 4: Find the Street View Thumbnail

Look at the place card. Inside it, you should see a small rectangular thumbnail image labeled "Street View," or sometimes just a photo with a circular arrow icon. This image is a preview of what the location looks like from the street. **Tap on this thumbnail.**

If you don't see a Street View thumbnail immediately, you may need to scroll left or right within the photos section of the place card, or tap "Photos" and then look for an image marked with the Street View icon (a small Pegman or a 360-degree symbol).

Step 5: Navigate the 360-Degree View

Once you tap the thumbnail, your screen will fill with the Street View panorama. You can now explore:

- **Drag your finger** across the screen to look around in any direction.
- **Tap on the white arrows** on the ground to move forward along the street.
- **Pinch the screen** (spread two fingers) to zoom in for a closer look, or pinch together to zoom out.

To exit, simply tap the "X" or the back arrow in the top left corner of the screen.

Method 3: How To Get Street View On Google Maps Using a Direct Search

Did you know you can sometimes jump straight into Street View? This is one of the fastest methods if you know exactly where you want to go. This works on both desktop and mobile.

On Desktop:

In the search bar, you can type the name of a landmark followed by "Street View," for example, "Eiffel Tower Street View." Google will often display a direct link to the Street View imagery as one of the top search results within Maps. Clicking this will take you directly into the panoramic view.

On Mobile (Android and iOS):

Search for a specific place, such as "Statue of Liberty." When the place card appears, scroll through the photos section. Often, the first image shown is the Street View image. Tap on it to enter the 360-degree view. You can also use the Google Search app or a web browser and search for "Street View near [your location]" to quickly find a nearby blue road to drop into.

Method 4: Exploring Indoors and Special Collections

Your journey does not have to stop at the street. Google Maps Street View has expanded to include the interiors of thousands of businesses, museums, and even stadiums. This is often called "Business View" or "Indoor Street View."

To access indoor views, search for a specific business, museum, or public venue. On the place card, look for a thumbnail that says "See inside" or "Explore inside." Tapping this will give you a 360-degree view of the interior, allowing you to walk through lobbies, galleries, and even specific rooms. This is incredibly useful for checking out a restaurant before making a reservation or exploring a museum exhibit from home.

Additionally, Google has curated special collections of Street View imagery from around the world. These include stunning natural landscapes, underwater dive sites, and remote historical sites. You can find these by visiting the "Street View Treks" section within the Google Maps menu (on desktop, click the menu icon with three horizontal lines and look for "Street View" or "Explore").

Common Troubleshooting: Why Can't I Get Street View?

Sometimes, despite your best efforts, Street View may not load or may not be available. Here are some common issues and solutions related to learning how to get Street View on Google Maps effectively.

No Blue Lines or Thumbnails Appear

This is the most common issue. Street View coverage is not universal. It is heavily concentrated in urban and suburban areas of many countries, but rural areas, private roads, and some countries have very limited or no coverage. If you do not see blue lines on the map, it simply means Google has not driven a Street View car down that road yet.

Street View is Blurry or Out of Date

Street View imagery is captured at different times. In some areas, the photos may be several years old. If the view is blurry, it may be due to a slow internet connection. Try zooming out and then back in, or wait for the high-resolution image to load. If the date is an issue, there is nothing you can do except check back later for updated imagery.

The App is Not Responding

If the mobile app freezes or crashes when you try to enter Street View, try these steps:

- **Force close the app** and reopen it.
- **Check for updates** in the App Store or Play Store.
- **Restart your phone.**
- **Reinstall the Google Maps app.**

Can't Find the Pegman Icon

On the desktop version, if you are zoomed out too far (showing an entire country or continent), the Pegman icon may disappear. Zoom in closer to a city or town, and the Pegman will reappear in the bottom right corner.
