What Are the Seventh Day Adventist Fundamental Beliefs 28?

Belief 6-7: The Nature of Humanity and the Great Controversy

Belief 6 — Creation: Adventists affirm the biblical account of creation in six literal days, with the Sabbath as a memorial. This belief is closely tied to the Seventh-day Adventist name and practice. **Belief 7** introduces the Great Controversy: a cosmic conflict between Christ and Satan that began in heaven and continues on earth. Understanding this conflict helps Adventists make sense of sin, suffering, and the ultimate plan of salvation. These two beliefs ground Adventist theology in a literal history and a cosmic narrative that gives meaning to every other belief.

Salvation and the Human Condition

The next cluster of beliefs addresses humanity’s fallen state and God’s remedy.

Belief 8-10: Sin, the Life of Christ, and Salvation

Belief 8 explains human nature and the reality of sin. Adventists hold that every person inherits a sinful nature from Adam and is personally guilty of sin. **Belief 9** details the life, death, and resurrection of Christ — the perfect sacrifice for sin. **Belief 10** focuses on the experience of salvation: it is a gift of grace received by faith, not by human effort. This trio of beliefs emphasizes that salvation is entirely from God, accessed through faith in Jesus, and results in a transformed life.

Belief 11: Growing in Christ

Belief 11 is often called “Growing in Christ.” It describes the Christian’s journey of sanctification — a cooperative process where God works in the believer to produce holiness. Prayer, Bible study, fellowship, and the power of the Holy Spirit are key. Adventists believe that while salvation is instantaneous, character transformation is a lifetime experience. This belief encourages daily surrender and reliance on God’s grace.

The Church and Its Mission

Beliefs 12 through 18 define what the church is and how it operates.

Belief 12-14: The Remnant, Unity, and Baptism

Belief 12 presents the church as the body of Christ, established by God to carry the gospel to the world. **Belief 13** describes the remnant church — a group of believers who keep the commandments of God and have the testimony of Jesus. Adventists see themselves as called to proclaim the three angels’ messages of Revelation. **Belief 14** explains baptism by immersion as a public declaration of faith in Christ. Baptism is required for church membership and symbolizes a new life in Christ.

Belief 15: The Lord’s Supper

Belief 15 covers the ordinance of the Lord’s Supper, including foot washing (the ordinance of humility) and the communion service. Adventists practice open communion, inviting all believers in Christ to participate. Foot washing is seen as a way to humble oneself and express service to one another, following Jesus’ example in John 13.

Belief 16-18: Spiritual Gifts, the Gift of Prophecy, and the Law of God

Belief 16 acknowledges that the Holy Spirit distributes spiritual gifts to every believer for the edification of the church. **Belief 17** specifically highlights the gift of prophecy, manifested in the ministry of Ellen G. White, considered a modern prophet whose writings guide but do not replace Scripture. **Belief 18** affirms the Ten Commandments as the eternal law of God, with the Sabbath (the fourth commandment) as a creation memorial and a sign of loyalty to God. This belief is central to Adventist identity and worship.

The Christian Life in Practice

Beliefs 19 through 24 shape how Adventists live daily.

Belief 19: The Sabbath

Perhaps the most distinctive of the **Seventh Day Adventist fundamental beliefs 28** is belief 19, which focuses on the Sabbath. Adventists worship on the seventh day (Saturday) as a holy day of rest, following the biblical example. The Sabbath is seen as a gift of time from God, a sanctuary in time, and a sign of the Creator’s authority. It is a day of communion with God and fellowship with others.

Belief 20-22: Stewardship, Christian Behavior, and Marriage

Belief 20 — Stewardship: God entrusts humans with time, talents, and resources. Tithing and offerings support the church’s mission. **Belief 21** — Christian Behavior: Adventists strive for a healthy lifestyle, avoiding harmful substances (alcohol, tobacco, unclean foods) and emphasizing the body as a temple of the Holy Spirit. **Belief 22** — Marriage and the Family: Marriage is a divine institution between a man and a woman, reflecting Christ’s love for the church. Family life is to be nurtured with love, respect, and biblical principles.

Belief 23-24: Work, Rest, and the Great Commission

Belief 23 — Work and Rest: Meaningful work is part of God’s plan, and rest (especially the Sabbath) restores balance. **Belief 24** — The Great Commission: Every believer is called to share the gospel, make disciples, and prepare the world for Christ’s soon return. Mission work, health outreach, and education are key expressions of this belief.

Hope for the Future: The Last Days

The final four beliefs focus on end-time events and God’s ultimate victory.

Belief 25: Christ’s Second Coming

Adventists believe in a literal, visible, and imminent return of Jesus Christ. Belief 25 describes that the Second Coming will be personal, and glorious, and will mark the end of sin. This hope motivates Adventist mission and lifestyle.

Belief 26: The Millennium and the End of Sin

Belief 26 explains the millennium — a thousand-year period between the first and second resurrections. During this time, the righteous live with Christ in heaven while the earth lies desolate. After the millennium, the wicked are raised, judged, and finally destroyed, bringing sin to an end.

Belief 27: The New Earth

Adventists look forward to the creation of a new earth, where righteousness dwells and God’s people live eternally in restored communion with Him. This belief gives hope beyond the present suffering and death.

Belief 28: The Judgment

The final belief, **Belief 28**, covers the judgment. Adventists teach an investigative judgment that began in 1844, based on the heavenly sanctuary imagery in Daniel and Hebrews. This judgment vindicates God’s character and determines who will be saved. The cross remains the only basis for salvation, and the judgment reveals that God’s grace is accepted.

Why the 28 Beliefs Matter Today

The **Seventh Day Adventist fundamental beliefs 28** are more than a list — they are a roadmap for living a life of faith, hope, and service. In a world searching for meaning, these doctrines offer a coherent picture of God’s love, the reality of the cosmic conflict, and the certainty of Christ’s return.
