Unlike national cable networks, local channels are assigned based on your service address. Your **Dish local channel lineup** can vary dramatically depending on whether you live in a major metropolitan area, a suburban region, or a rural location.

Dish Network is legally required to offer local channels in all designated market areas (DMAs) where it provides service. However, the number of channels and the specific affiliates included can differ. To see your exact guide, you can use the "Local Channels" feature on your Dish remote, visit the MyDish website, or simply check the on-screen programming menu. The guide updates automatically with your local schedule, making it easy to plan your viewing for evening news, primetime shows, or weekend sports.

How to Find Your Local Channels on Dish

Using Your Remote Control

The fastest way to pull up your local channels is to press the **Guide** button on your Dish remote. Then navigate to the "All Channels" or "Local" filter. Depending on your receiver model, you may also have a dedicated "Locals" button. Channels are typically listed in numerical order, usually starting in the 2-69 range (though some markets have moved channels due to the digital transition). For example, in New York City, you might see WCBS (CBS) on channel 2, WNBC (NBC) on channel 4, and WABC (ABC) on channel 7.

Using MyDish Online

If you prefer to check your local lineup before you sit down to watch, log into your account at MyDish.com. Under the "Programming" section, you will find a "Local Channels" tab. Enter your ZIP code or service address, and the system will generate a complete list of available local stations, including their channel numbers and any HD or SD variants. This is especially useful if you are considering upgrading your package or adding a second receiver in another room.

Using the DishAnywhere App

The DishAnywhere app also provides access to your local channel guide. You can browse the lineup from your smartphone or tablet, set reminders, and even schedule recordings. This feature is a lifesaver when you are away from home and want to make sure you don't miss your hometown news or a live local event.

Which Local Networks Are Included?

While the exact channels vary by market, the **Dish Network local channel availability** almost always includes the four major broadcast networks:

- **ABC** – Known for local news, daytime talk, prime-time dramas, and sports (including NBA and NHL games on weekends).
- **CBS** – Offers strong local news coverage, the NFL (especially AFC games), and popular shows like "60 Minutes" and "NCIS."
- **NBC** – Provides local news, "The Tonight Show," NFL Sunday Night Football, and the Olympics.
- **Fox** – Features local news (often in the morning and evening), NFL (NFC games), MLB, and animated comedies.

Additionally, most markets include one or more of these supplemental networks:

- **PBS** – Multiple local PBS stations may be available, offering educational, children's, and public affairs programming.
- **The CW** – Primetime hits, reality shows, and younger-skewing sports.
- **MyNetworkTV** – Mostly reruns of popular drama series.
- **Independent stations** – Some cities have independent locals carrying classic TV, movies, or regional sports.

Regional Sports Networks (RSNs) and Local Content

Beyond the big broadcasters, many Dish subscribers care deeply about **regional sports networks** like Bally Sports, NBC Sports Regional, or Altitude Sports. These channels carry local MLB, NBA, NHL, and MLS teams. However, Dish's carriage agreements with some RSNs have been inconsistent. If you are a sports fan, check your **Dish local channel lineup** carefully before subscribing. In some markets, you may need to upgrade to a higher-tier package (like America's Top 120+ or above) to access these regional channels.

If your favorite local sports channel is not available through Dish, you can still use an over-the-air antenna for local broadcast games (e.g., Thursday Night Football on Fox or NFL Network simulcasts). Alternatively, streaming services like Bally Sports+ (where available) can supplement your Dish subscription.

HD vs. SD Local Channels

Most local channels on Dish are broadcast in high definition (HD) as long as you have an HD receiver and a subscription to the HD package (included in most packages today). The **Dish Network Local Channel Guide** will usually list two versions of each local station: one with an HD designation (e.g., 2-1 vs. 2-0) and one in standard definition. Always watch the HD version if you care about picture quality, especially for sports and nature documentaries. If you have an older receiver, you may be limited to SD only.

This means you can watch network local stations for free (after the initial antenna cost) without needing a full satellite subscription. This hybrid setup is perfect for budget-conscious viewers who only want local news and major network shows.

Troubleshooting Missing Local Channels

It can be frustrating when a channel you expect to see doesn't appear in your guide. Here are common reasons and fixes:

Check Your Service Address

Your local channels are tied to your service address. If you moved recently and did not update your account, Dish may still be sending you the lineup for your old city. Contact Dish customer support to update your physical location.

Update Your Receiver

Occasionally, Dish adds or removes local channels due to retransmission negotiations. Your receiver needs to download the latest channel lineup. Try pressing the **System Info** button on your remote and selecting "Update Channels" or perform a "Reset" from the settings menu.

Antenna-Related Issues (Hopper Models)

If you are using an over-the-air antenna with your Hopper, make sure the antenna is properly connected and positioned. A weak signal can cause channels to drop or fail to scan. Run the "Channel Scan" tool from the Hopper's settings to rediscover available stations.

Seasonal or Temporary Blackouts

Occasionally, certain local events (like a high school football championship or a pay-per-view fight) may be blacked out on Dish due to league restrictions. Blackouts are rare for regular local programming but can affect sports. Check the "Info" screen before the program to see if a blackout applies.

Use the Favorites Feature

Create a "Favorites" list that includes only your local channels. On your Dish remote, press **Menu**, then "Favorites," and select your preferred local stations. This way, when you press the **Guide** button, you can quickly filter to see only the channels you watch most.

Set Up Recordings for Local Shows

The Hopper DVR allows you to record entire series from local channels. If you always miss the 6 PM news, set a daily recording for your local ABC or NBC affiliate. With the AutoHop feature (for premium channels), you can even skip commercials on recorded prime-time content from the big four networks after they air.

Explore Subchannels with an Antenna

If your Dish receiver supports OTA integration, you can add broadcast subchannels that Dish does not carry—like **Ion Television**, **MeTV**, **Grit**, or **Comet**. These free channels are available over the air in many markets and can significantly expand your viewing options without an extra monthly fee. A simple outdoor or window antenna costing \$20–\$50 can make a huge difference.

Future of Local Channels on Dish

As the television landscape shifts toward streaming, Dish Network continues to invest in its local channel infrastructure. The company has been working on integrating streaming apps directly into the Hopper interface, so you may eventually be able to access local station streaming apps without switching inputs.
