3. Cream of Tartar and Lemon Juice

Cream of tartar is a fine white powder often used in baking, but it also works as a mild acidic cleaner. Combined with lemon juice, it creates an effective rust-removing paste.

Application:

- Mix cream of tartar with enough lemon juice to form a paste.
- Spread the paste over the rust stain.
- Leave it on for 30 minutes to 1 hour.
- Rinse with cold water and wash immediately.

This method is particularly safe for delicate fabrics such as silk or wool, as long as you do not scrub vigorously.

4. Oxalic Acid (Natural Alternative: Rhubarb or Spinach)

Oxalic acid is a naturally occurring compound found in certain plants like rhubarb leaves and spinach. It is highly effective at dissolving iron oxide. However, because oxalic acid is potent, it should be used with care. You can buy commercially prepared oxalic acid crystals, or you can boil rhubarb leaves (inedible parts) to create a natural solution.

Safe method with commercial oxalic acid:

- Dissolve one tablespoon of oxalic acid crystals in one liter of warm water.
- Soak the stained garment in the solution for 15–20 minutes.
- Check the stain; if it has lightened, rinse thoroughly with cold water.
- Neutralize the acid by adding a small amount of baking soda to the rinse water.
- Launder as usual.

Warning: Oxalic acid is toxic and should be handled with gloves. Keep away from children and pets. Do not use on wool or silk, as it can damage protein fibers.

Commercial Products and Stain Removers

If natural methods do not yield results, or if you prefer a ready-to-use solution, several commercial products are designed specifically for **removing rust from clothes**.

1. Whink Rust Stain Remover

Whink is a well-known brand that produces a liquid rust remover safe for most washable fabrics (excluding silk, wool, and leather). It contains hydrofluoric acid, so it is potent but efficient.

Soak the garment in a solution of warm water and oxygen bleach powder for several hours or overnight. This method is gentle enough for most fabrics but best on whites or light colors.

How to Remove Rust from Cotton and Denim

Cotton and denim are sturdy and can withstand stronger treatments. For these fabrics, lemon juice and salt, oxalic acid, or commercial rust removers work well. Always rinse thoroughly and avoid using chlorine bleach, as it can react with rust and worsen the stain.

How to Remove Rust from Synthetic Fabrics (Polyester, Nylon, Acrylic)

Synthetics are less absorbent than natural fibers, which can make rust stains easier to treat. Use a gentle method such as white vinegar or a paste of cream of tartar. Avoid prolonged soaking in acidic solutions, as it may weaken the synthetic fibers.
