You can also feed your wolf to heal it even when it’s sitting.

Breeding Wolves for a Pack

If you want more than one wolf, you can breed them. To breed two tamed wolves, feed each one any type of meat (raw or cooked, but not fish). When both wolves have been fed, hearts will appear, and a baby wolf will spawn after a few seconds. The baby will inherit the collar color of one of its parents (by default red). You can also breed wolves to create a large pack that guards your base or helps you hunt.

Dye Your Wolf’s Collar

To change the color of your tamed wolf’s collar, simply hold any dye in your hand and right-click the wolf. You can choose from any of the 16 standard Minecraft dyes.

This is purely cosmetic but can help you distinguish between different wolves in a pack or simply match your base's color scheme.

Tips and Tricks for Taming Wolves
