How are parents and guardians involved when behavioral concerns arise?

Questions About Professional Development and Growth

Questions About Resources and Support

What is the student demographic makeup, and what are the unique strengths and needs of the population?

This question shows cultural awareness. A good school will discuss diversity openly and describe specific initiatives that support equity and inclusion.

How does the school engage families and the broader community?

Family engagement can take many forms — from parent-teacher conferences to community events to volunteer programs. Look for genuine partnerships rather than perfunctory communication.

Questions About Retention and Stability
