Verbs That Use Être as an Auxiliary

Many of these are verbs of motion or change of state. Their past participles must agree with the subject.

- Aller* (to go) → *allé*
- Arriver* (to arrive) → *arrivé*
- Partir* (to leave) → *parti*
- Sortir* (to go out) → *sorti*
- Monter* (to go up) → *monté*
- Descendre* (to go down) → *descendu*
- Entrer* (to enter) → *entré*
- Rester* (to stay) → *resté*
- Tomber* (to fall) → *tombé*
- Retourner* (to return) → *retourné*
- Devenir* (to become) → *devenu*
- Revenir* (to come back) → *revenu*

Notice that verbs like *monter* and *descendre* can also be used transitively (with a direct object). In those cases, they take *avoir* instead of *être*.
