The Essential Components of a Sample APA Interview Paper

Every well-written APA interview paper follows a logical structure that guides the reader from the research question to the conclusions drawn from the interview data. While specific requirements may vary by course or institution, the following sections are standard.

Title Page

The title page includes the paper title, the author's name, the institutional affiliation, the course name and number, the instructor's name, and the assignment due date. For a student paper, a running head is not required by APA 7th edition, but a page number should appear in the top right corner. The title should clearly reflect the focus of the interview, such as "The Lived Experience of Remote Work: An Interview Study."

Introduction

The introduction sets the stage by

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presenting the research topic, its significance, and the specific questions the interview aimed to explore. It should end with a clear statement of purpose, such as "This paper presents the findings from a semi-structured interview with a first-generation college student to understand the challenges and supports encountered during the transition to university life."

In any **Sample Apa Interview Paper**, the introduction is concise yet provides enough context for the reader to understand why the interview was conducted and what gap in knowledge it addresses. Avoid overly broad claims; instead, ground the study in relevant

literature.

Method Section

The method section describes how the interview was conducted. It includes several subheadings:

A strong sample will show transparency about the methods, allowing the reader to assess the trustworthiness of the

findings.

Findings or Results

This is the heart of the paper. Here, you present the interview data in an organized manner, typically around key themes that emerged from the analysis. Use direct quotations from the participant to illustrate each theme. For example, if the interview explored workplace stress, a theme might be "Lack of Control," and you would include a quote like the participant stating, "I felt like I had no say in how my day was structured."

When writing this section, it is

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important to weave the quotes into your own analytical narrative. Do not simply list quotes; explain what each quote reveals and how it relates to the research question. Discussion

References

In APA style, the reference list includes all sources cited in the paper. However, remember that personal communications, such as interviews, are not included in the reference list. Instead, they are cited in the text only. Use the format: (J. Smith, personal communication, March 15, 2024). A sample paper will demonstrate this

distinction clearly.

Appendices

If your instructor requires it, include the interview questions or a portion of the transcript in an appendix. This allows the reader to see the exact wording of your prompts and the richness of the participant's responses.

How to Cite an Interview in APA Style

One of the most confusing aspects of writing an APA interview paper is understanding how to cite the interview

itself. Since the interview is not a published, recoverable source, it is treated as a personal communication. This rule applies whether you conducted the interview yourself or you are citing an interview that someone else conducted and that was published in a recoverable format, such as a podcast transcript or a newspaper article.

Citing Your Own Interview

When you are the interviewer, cite the participant's words as a personal communication in the text. For example: The participant described feeling "overwhelmed by the pace of

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change" (M. Torres, personal communication, April 2, 2024). Do not include an entry in the reference list.

Citing a Published Interview

If you are referencing an interview that was published in a magazine, journal, or book, you cite it as you would any other source. Include the author, date, title, and source information in the reference list. For example, an interview published in *The New York Times* would be cited as a newspaper article.

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Use a Thematic Approach to Analysis

Read through your transcript multiple times, highlighting phrases that relate to your research question. Group these phrases into themes. Each theme should capture a pattern of meaning across the data. A well-organized findings section will present two to four major themes, each supported by multiple quotes.

Maintain the Participant's Voice

When you quote the participant, preserve their language, including non-

standard grammar or colloquialisms, unless doing so would cause confusion. If you need to clarify something, use brackets. For example: "It was [the policy change] that really affected our team." This shows respect for the participant's perspective while ensuring clarity for the reader.

Edit for APA Compliance

Before submitting, check your paper against APA 7th edition guidelines. Verify the formatting of the title page, headings, font, margins, and page numbers. Ensure that all quotes are properly introduced and that the tone is formal yet accessible. A sample paper

Common Mistakes to Avoid
