Cable and Satellite Providers in Las Vegas

DIRECTV and DISH Network

Satellite services are particularly popular in areas of Las Vegas where cable infrastructure is limited, such as in newer suburbs or rural outskirts like Pahrump. Both DIRECTV and DISH provide extensive channel lineups, but they require a clear line of sight to the southern sky. Popular Streaming Services with Local Channels

Each streaming service provides its own electronic program guide (EPG), which functions exactly like a traditional TV guide. You can scroll through channels, see show descriptions, set recordings, and even start programs from the beginning if you join late.

Sports Programming: The Lifeblood of Las Vegas TV

Las Vegas has become a major sports city in the last decade. With the arrival of the NHL's Vegas Golden Knights, the NFL's Las Vegas Raiders, the WNBA's Las Vegas Aces, and the soon-to-arrive MLB's Athletics, sports viewing is at an all-time high. Local Sports Networks

Sports Betting Integrated Guides

For example, on certain sports channels, you might see live odds displayed during a game. Some providers like Cox offer a Sports & Betting channel that functions as a scrolling **TV guide for Las Vegas** tailored to gambling interests. Local News and Community Programming
