- **What is the Original Man?** The answer establishes the Black man as the creator, owner, and ruler of the universe, introducing the concept of the "Asiatic Black Man" as the original human being.
- **What is the Devil?** This lesson provides a historical and allegorical explanation for the white race, not as inherently evil spirits, but as a grafted, weaker race created by a scientist named Yakub through a process of birth control and inbreeding over 6,000 years. This is one of the most controversial and defining lessons.

These lessons are intentionally simple in structure but profound in their claims. They were meant to completely upend the worldview of a member, replacing self-hatred with a sense of primordial power and nobility. The question-and-answer format made them easy to memorize and recite, ensuring ideological purity across a largely unlettered population.

The Lessons for the Laborers: Deeper Knowledge

For those who proved their commitment and were ready for more responsibility, the "Actual Facts" (or "Laborer Lessons") were made available. These lessons, known to contain the "3+3=6" facts, are more advanced and deal with the practical application of the Supreme Wisdom. They cover subjects like:

- **The Secret of the Sun and Moon:** A deeper, more intricate explanation of the relationship between the sun, moon, and earth, tying it to the fate of nations and individuals.
- **The Time and Location of the Judgment:** Lessons on the coming "battle of Armageddon," interpreted not as a future cosmic event but as a war of ideas and physical destruction between the forces of good (the Black nation) and evil (the white world). The lessons specifically pinpoint the year and location.
- **The Science of Being Born and Dying:** A unique explanation of the soul, the spirit, and the process of physical and spiritual death and rebirth.
- **The Structure of the Nation:** Instructions on how the Nation of Islam should be organized, including the roles of the Minister, the Captain of the Fruit of Islam (FOI), and the Secretary.

The Laborer Lessons are significantly more complex and require extensive study under a qualified Minister. They are considered to contain the "meat" of the knowledge needed to not only save oneself but to help save the entire Lost Found Nation. Mastering these lessons was a prerequisite for becoming a Minister or a high-ranking official in the Nation of Islam.

The Purpose and Target Audience: "The Lost Found Nation"

The lessons are designed to be self-contained and sufficient. They discourage independent reading of the Bible or other religious texts without the guidance of the lessons. Key biblical figures like Moses, Jesus, and John the Baptist are reinterpreted as prophets and teachers who came to the "Lost Sheep of the House of Israel" (the Black people), not to the white world. The lessons claim that the Bible has been tampered with and that only Master Fard Muhammad and Elijah Muhammad can provide the correct interpretation.
