7. **Cleanup:** The piercer will clean the area with sterile saline and provide you with detailed aftercare instructions.

Belly Button Piercing Aftercare: The Most Critical Phase

The procedure itself is quick, but the healing journey is long and requires diligence. Daily Cleaning Routine

1. **Wash your hands** thoroughly before touching the piercing area.

4. Gently pat the area dry with a clean paper towel or sterile gauze. A damp environment encourages bacterial growth.
5. Perform this cleaning routine 2-3 times a day, especially after showering or exercising.

What to Avoid

- **Harsh Chemicals:** Never use alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, or antibacterial soaps. They are too harsh and will damage the healing tissue.
- **Swimming:** Avoid pools, hot tubs, lakes, and oceans for at least the first 2-3 months. These bodies of water are breeding grounds for bacteria that can cause severe infections.
- **Tight Clothing:** Avoid high-waisted jeans, belts, and tight waistbands. The constant friction and pressure can cause the jewelry to migrate or become irritated.
- **Sleeping on Your Stomach:** This can put direct pressure on the piercing. Sleeping on your back or side is better during the initial healing phase.
- **Playing with the Jewelry:** It is tempting, but do not touch or fiddle with the jewelry. Your hands are covered in bacteria.
- **Changing Jewelry Early:** Do not change your jewelry until the piercing is fully healed. This means waiting at least 6 months, and often closer to a year. A professional piercer can help you with an initial downsize if the original bar is too long after the swelling subsides.

Healing Timeline and What to Expect

- **Keloids and Scarring:** Some people are prone to keloids (raised, overgrown scar tissue). Irritation bumps are very common and usually resolve with better aftercare (like not sleeping on it or wearing tight clothing).
- **Snagging and Tearing:** The jewelry can easily catch on loofahs, towels, seat belts, and clothing. Be mindful at all times.
