Even so, the image of the two icons sharing an intimate meal has persisted in popular culture as the symbol of a lost Hollywood love affair.

To date, no concrete evidence exists—no letters, no photographs of them together in an intimate setting, no diary entries—that confirm a romantic relationship. Hepburn’s son, Sean Hepburn Ferrer, wrote in his memoir *Audrey Hepburn: An Elegant Spirit* that his mother admired Dean’s talent but had no special closeness to him. He specifically dismissed rumors of an affair, calling them “an invention of journalists desperate for a story.”

Shared Connections and Common Ground
